Bauer Signs Pact As Oriole Manager

BALTIMORE (AP) — Baltimore Orioles ended seven weeks of suspense Tuesday by officially naming Hank Bauer their new field manager, an announcement that no longer surprised anyone.

The 41-year-old Bauer had been first choice in the minds of most local experts as soon as Billy Hitchcock was fired at the end of the 1963 season.

They became certain 11 days ago when Eddie Stanky, farm director for St. Louis Cardinals, said he could not come to terms with the Orioles. Bauer, general manager of the Orioles, said it was understood that Stanky held out for a long-term contract.

The Orioles said Bauer had signed a one-year pact. MacPhail issued no statement in connection with the announcement.

Bauer will be the fifth manager of the Orioles since they joined the American League in 1954. An outfielder for 13 seasons with New York Yankees and Kansas City Athletics, Bauer also managed the Athletics before coming to the Orioles as coach.

Bauer joined the Orioles at the end of the 1962 season and served as third base coach last year under the departed Hitchcock.

Open Season On Grizzlies Is N.W.T. Aim

OTTAWA (CP)—It will be open season on Northwest Territories grizzly bears soon. And a sanctuary is being established for a selected breeding herd of the nearly-extinct wood buffalo—bigger and darker than the plains bison which once roamed the Prairies as big game hunting licenses.

These measures are provided in a bill—of ordinance—studied Tuesday by an emergency session of the expanded Northwest Territories Council.

The grizzlies, found in the western end of the territories, have never mated in the past and are being killed year-round by holders of general and big game hunting licenses.

The wood buffalo was discovered in 1950 to be still holding out in a remote section of Wood Buffalo National Park, straddling the Alberta-N.W.T. boundary where the plains species had been transported for preservation some years ago.

Eighty-one of the herd of about 200 were tested for TB and brucellosis disease and 23 retained for transfer to a sanctuary. Further tests culled 20 more and the rest were moved north sooner than scheduled because of the outbreak of anthrax, a bacteriological disease spread by fungi, among caribou herds.

That was "good enough for a team who say down and lay down for good reasons last Saturday," the mayor said.

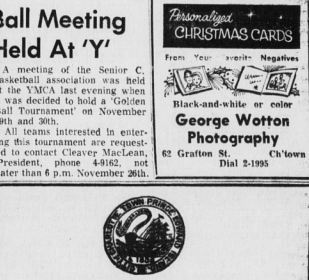
