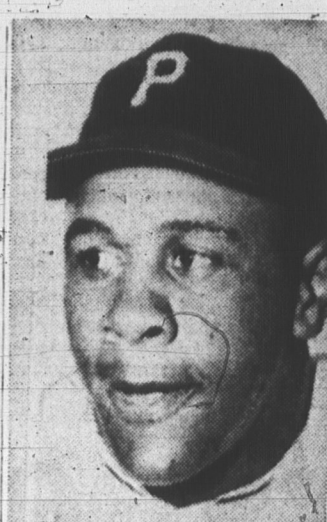


Mets Split Doubleheader; Giants Take Eight Straight

NEW YORK (AP) — Dennis Ribant, given a five-run cushion in the third inning, pitched a five-hitter as New York Mets defeated Chicago Cubs 5-1 and gained a split of their National League doubleheader, Sunday.

The Cubs won the opener 3-1 after being held hitless for five innings by Jack Hamilton. Ribant gave up a two-out home run to Billy Williams in the first inning, then blanked the Cubs the rest of the way in the nightcap.

Don Kessinger and Jim Stewart singled with one out in the eighth, but Ribant retired Glenn Beckert on a grounder and struck out George Altman.

Jim Hickman triggered the Mets' big inning with a leadoff homer.

Beckert got the first hit off Hamilton in the opener, a sixth-inning single that drove in two runs and wiped out a 1-0 lead the Mets had taken on Dick Stuart's homer.

Beckert singled after Kessinger walked and Dick St. Louis reached first when Hamilton's throw to second was too late to force Kessinger.

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Pinch hitter Willie McCovey belted a three-run homer on the first pitch in the sixth inning to propel San Francisco Giants to a 10-5 victory over St. Louis Cardinals and their eighth straight win Sunday.

McCovey's blast to left of re-never Tracy Stallard broke a 5-5 tie and spoiled the Cardinals' last game in Busch Stadium, the oldest park left in the major leagues. Baseball was first played at the stadium site in 1866.

St. Louis will move into its new \$24,000,000 home Thursday night. The club has given the old stadium to the Boys Club. The weak hitting Cardinals

cracked three home runs. Tim McCarver hit a two-run homer, Bob Skinner hit a pinch-hit two-run homer in a four-run fourth inning and Mike Shannon belted a solo homer in the fifth.

The Giants scored three runs in the first inning. Jim Hart clubbed a two-run homer in the third. Tito Fuentes singled and scored in the seventh for another after McCovey's sixth-inning blast.

HOUSTON (AP)—Joe Morgan singled in a run in the ninth inning, capping a two-run rally that gave Houston Astros a 5-4 victory over Atlanta Braves Sunday.

The Astros scored the runs with the help of errors by Frank Bolling and Woody Woodward.

Rusty Staub reached first on Bolling's error, moved to third on Bob Aspromonte's single and scored as Woodward threw wild on Lee Maye's grounder.

Phil Niekro got pinch hitter

Felix Mantilla to force Aspromonte at the plate. Billy O'Dell, relieved Niekro and Morgan singled to right, scoring Maye with the winning run.

The Braves had taken a 4-3 lead with two runs in the eighth. Joe Torre, whose two passed balls helped the Astros to three runs in the sixth, singled in the tying run, and Lee Thomas followed with a single for the lead run.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Bill Mazerowski singled across the tie-breaking run in the sixth inning and Bob Veale scattered eight hits as Pittsburgh Pirates edged Philadelphia Phillies 3-2 Sunday.

Willie Stargell walked to open the sixth, raced to third on Donn Clendenen's single and scored as Mazerowski singled to left field.

That broke a 2-2 tie the Phillies created with runs in third and fourth of Veale's blanked the Phillies the rest of the way and picked up his third victory against one defeat.

Veale singled across the Pirates' first run in the second and a single by Stargell and Jim Pagniaroni's double gave the Pirates' another in the third.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Jim O'Toole, with relief help from Billy McCool, pitched and batted Cincinnati Reds to a 2-1 victory over Los Angeles Dodgers Sunday.

O'Toole went seven innings, allowing only three hits, and knocked in what proved to be the winning run for the Reds in the fourth inning. McCool completed a four-hitter.

Deron Johnson led off the Reds' fourth with a walk and went to third on Don Pavletich's single. John scored on Tony Perez' fly ball to center field, and after Leo Cardenas singled and Tommy Harper struck out, O'Toole scored Pavletich with a single.

Ron Fairly led off the Dodgers' eighth inning with a second single and after a walk to Wes Parker, scored when Tommy Helms' booted Tommy Davis' grounder ball.

Claude Osteen, Dodger starter, was the loser and is 4-3.

Sherbrooke Beavers Trounce Drumheller

CALGARY (CP)—Defending champion Sherbrooke Beavers bounced Drumheller Miners 4-1 Saturday night to even the best-of-seven 1966 Allan Cup final series at one game each. About 2,100 fans saw the game.

Former professional Guy Black paced Beavers' attack with two goals and an assist as Beavers rebounded from a 6-3

defeat in the opening game. Claude Cardin and Gil Cartier completed the scoring.

The third game will be played Tuesday night.

Beavers led 2-0 after the first period and 3-1 after the second. Drumheller's goal was scored by Gene Lambert.

Serge Aubry blocked 29 shots for Sherbrooke. Drumheller goaltender, Al Rollins, a former standout with Chicago Black Hawks and Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, stopped 22.

Beavers, smaller and faster than their aggressive opponents, drew six of 10 penalties. Owen Mailey of Miners squared off with Larry Drouin late in the game and each picked up a major for high-sticking.

In the dressing room, coach-general manager Georges Roy of Sherbrooke threatened to pull his club out of the series if referee John Kotzma of Yorkton was allowed to continue. Roy asked that Dutchy van Deelen of Edmonton be used in Kotzma's place.

GREENWOOD, N.S. (CP)—RCAF Station Summerside, P.E.I., Saturday won the Maritime five-pin bowling championship here.

The Summerside team finished the three-day tournament with 44½ points to take the title.

Kauai King Whips Field In Kentucky Derby Race

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Kauai King, owned, trained and ridden by Kentucky Derby novice, won the 92nd running of the race Saturday with a mighty display of front-running speed.

Off in front in the 1¼-mile race, the Maryland-bred son of Native Dancer-Sweeper In by Blenheim II never relinquished the lead. He became the first Derby winner since Jet Pilot in 1947 to set all the pace in taking the \$163,000 run for the roses.

Kauai King, named for a Hawaiian island which legends says never was conquered, carried the white-and-blue silks of Michael Ford, 41-year-old father of three from Omaha, Neb.

The colt was trained by Henry Forrest, 59-year-old native of Covington, Ky., now living in Bigwood, Tenn., and ridden by 28-year-old Don Brumfield of Nicholasville, Ky.

Kauai King broke from the starting gate to gain a narrow advantage, coasted to a two-length lead in the run down the backstretch and then responded to his rider's left-handed whip, depending to hold off the stretch challenges of Stupendous and then

the lightly-regarded Advocate and Blue Skyer.

WINS BY HALF LENGTH Kauai King hit the finish line with a half-length margin over Advocate, ridden by Johnny Sellers and carrying the hopes of Mrs. Ada L. Rice of Chicago, last year's winner with Debonair.

It took the camera to separate Advocate from Blue Skyer, a last-thought entry owned by M.

J. Padgett of Louisville and Hugh Grant of Bradford, Pa. He was ridden by Earlie Fires. Pires, who got the mount on Blue Skyer late Friday after Sean E. Indian was scratched, was another three-quarters of a length ahead of Stupendous from Mrs. H. D. Phipps' stable.

Back among the also rans were the two big disappointments—Abe's Hope and Amberold. Abe's Hope, the second choice, wound up fifth. Amberold, well backed at 6-1, was seventh in the field of 15 three-year-olds.

Both started slowly and never threatened.

VICTORIA (CP)—Victoria Maple Leafs, overcoming a two-goal first-period deficit with a sparkling display of hockey, took a 3-2 lead in the best-of-seven Western Hockey League final by defeating Portland Buckaroos 4-2 here Saturday night before a capacity Memorial Arena crowd of 5,030.

The sixth game will be played in Portland tonight. If a seventh game is needed it will be played either in Portland Tuesday night or in Victoria Wednesday, depending on availability of the Portland arena.

Formation of a five-team New Brunswick — Prince Edward Island junior hockey league was discussed at a meeting of hockey officials here Saturday.

Moncton and Saint John said they would definitely be willing to compete in a Junior league while Charlottetown, Summerside and Fredericton expressed interest. However, representatives from the latter three centres said they would not commit themselves before a meeting scheduled at Moncton June 5.

Officials from the five-team Cape Breton Junior hockey league said they may be interested in playing an inter-locking schedule, or exhibition games with the new league. The Cape Breton league includes Glace Bay, Sydney, North Sydney, Xavier Junior College and Port Hawkesbury.

Murray Neustader of Saint John, organizer of the meeting, said the two leagues should merge and the twin-cities league of Halifax-Dartmouth should come under the same governing body.

John Kelly of Saint John, speaking for the Halifax Canadians, told the meeting the Canadians may not be interested in playing in the proposed league. He said Canadians are seeking a franchise in the Ontario Junior "A" series. There were other reports that Halifax is seeking a franchise in the Quebec Junior hockey league.

LOW CALIBER Terry Fraser of Moncton said the league would be called "Junior 'A' although the calibre would probably be Junior 'C'."

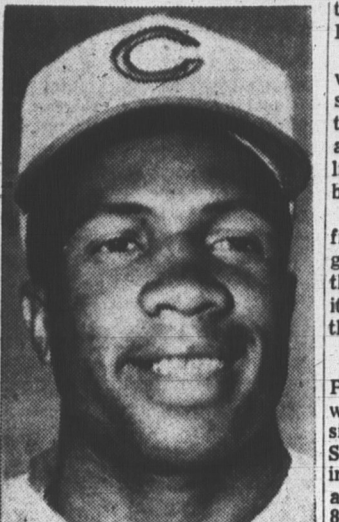

Birds Beat Tribe Twice; Yanks Grab 2nd Straight

BALTIMORE (AP)—Baltimore Orioles walloped five home runs, including a tape-measure shot by Frank Robinson, and buried Cleveland 8-2 and '8-3 in a Sunday doubleheader.

Robinson became the first player ever to hit a ball out of Memorial Stadium when his drive in the first inning of the second game cleared the left field bleachers.

The Orioles later reported the ball travelled 451 feet on the fly and rolled to a stop 540 feet from home plate. Previous homers by Harmon Killebrew and Boog Powell, over the center field hedge inside the ball park had travelled slightly farther.

Robinson, who also homered in the first game and now has seven in his first American League season, was given a prolonged standing ovation when he took the field in the second inning of the nightcap.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP)—New York Yankees capitalized on six walks and two errors Sunday, beating California Angels 5-2 for their second straight victory since Ralph Houk replaced Johnny Keane as manager.

Second-inning errors by right fielder Jack Warner and shortstop Jim Fregosi let in as many as seven straight losses at the hand of Dean Chance. The errors followed singles by Roger Maris and Cleo Boyer.

Pedro Ramos pitched three strong innings of relief for the Yankees, saving the victory for Al Downing—his first in four decisions this year. Bobby Knop knocked in both Angel runs with a single and an unusual sacrifice fly—to second baseman Bobby Richardson.

Mickey Mantle drove in the third Yankee run with a sixth-inning single that knocked Chance from the box.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Bob Saverine's pinch-hit single, only the second hit of the game for Washington, drove in the winning run in the 10th inning and gave the Senators a 3-2 victory

the first game of an American League doubleheader.

The Tigers loaded the bases with one out on Jerry Lumpe's single, Bill Skowron's bad throw on Norm Cash's grounder and an infield single by Al Kaline. Brown then belted a double for the winning runs.

Hank Aguirre's bad throw to first on Skowron's grounder gave the White Sox a run in the first inning, but Detroit tied it on Bill Freehan's homer in the third.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Rico Petrocelli drove in five runs with a grand slam homer and a single in the opener and George Scott and Dalton Jones homered in the nightcap as Boston swept a doubleheader from Minnesota 8-1 and 4-1 Sunday.

The double victory smashed Boston's string of 17 straight losses to the Twins dating back to May 27, 1965. The Red Sox also had lost 17 in a row to Minnesota here since May 31, 1964.

Jones' seventh-inning solo homer was the deciding blow in the second game as Jose Santiago and Darrell Brandon teamed to hurl a four-hitter at the Twins.

Wille Kirkland led off the 10th with a walk and took second on a wild pitch by reliever John Wyatt. Saverine then singled to center for the clincher.

Talbot went out for a pinch hitter when Kansas City tied the score in their half of the eighth. Ozzie Chavarria, batting for Talbot, hit a single.

Bert Campaneris tripped him home, then scored the tying run on Wayne Causey's sacrifice fly.

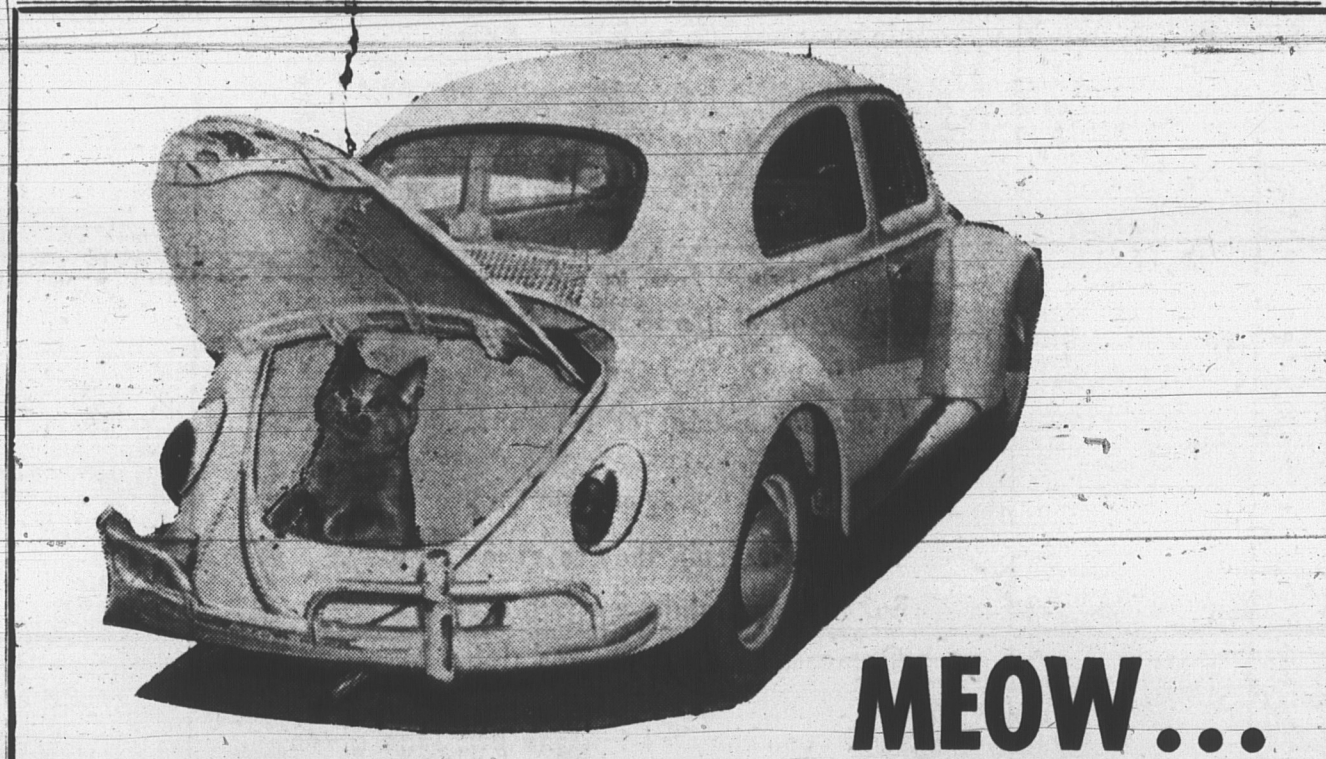
Talbot trailed 1-0 until Casanova homered over the left field fence. The smash cleared the fence about 380 feet from the plate and was hit into the face of a strong wind.
