Unitarian Services Are Meeting Their Objectives

It takes more than record-breaking cold weather to discourage Ottawa children who have decided to go carol singing. In below zero temperatures, Gloria Rennick, 121 Drummond Street, helped to bundle up brother Billy and sister Nancy, and with neighbours Ronnie and Karla-Stevenson, they sang until their pockets were filled. The next morning Gloria brought 200 Unitarian Service Committee headquarters, 78 Sparks Street, Ottawa.

"To send milk to the children in India and Korea," she explained. Because only 2 cents will pay the shipping costs on one pound of government-donated milk powder, the contribution will provide many glasses of milk for needy children abroad.

Neighbours at H. M. C. S. Carleton, Ottawa, have coffee parties like most suburban districts across the country, but with a difference. Ten cents goes into the "pot" for every cup of coffee poured, and the funds are used to buy flanellette to boost the Unitarian Service Committee drive to send 25,000 layettes to Arab refugee babies.

To date, over 10,000 layettes each consisting of 4 diapers, 2 nightgowns, 2 jackets, 2 shirts, 1 cake of soap, 1 towel, and 4 safety pins have been dispatched to the Middle East. To complete the project, the USC is appealing for outgrown baby clothing and baby shirts knitted from ends of wool. Scald 1 cup milk
Stir in 3 tbsps. brown sugar
1 tsp. salt
3 tbsps. shortening
Cool to lukewarm.
Measure into large bowl
1/2 c. lukewarm water
Stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar
Sprinkle with contents of 1 envelope Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast

Work in additional 3/4 c. whole wheat flour

Turn out on floured board; knead until smooth. Cut dough into 24 equal-sized pieces. Shape pieces into smooth balls. Roll each one into a 2 1/2" x 3 1/2" oval. Fold over crosswise. Place well apart on greased cookie sheet; press edges together lightly. Grease tops. Cover. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 3/4 hr. Bake in hot oven, 400°, 15 to 20 mins. Yield: 2 doz.
