LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Scenes in England.

INTERESTING LETTER FROM WILLIAM HEARD,

ESQUIRE.

SIR,—Having decided on spending the

winter in England, it occurs to me that both

you and your readers would not object to a

find changes beyond anything I had antici-

ipated. Cities, towns and villages have

in many instances undergone great altera-

tions. The improvements made in the

style and proportions of public and private

buildings, the cleanliness and smoothness

of the streets, the admirable system of

sewerage, and the abundant water supply,

bringing increased health and comfort into

every department of private life,—seems

to stand out in striking contrast with our own

lack of enterprise or estimate of the vastly

increased comforts which others possess,
