## Caendish Man Found Guilty In Two Counts

Alan McCoubrey, Caendish, appearing at a special session of Queens County magistrate's court, was convicted on two charges by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, last evening.

On the first count that of creating a disturbance in a public place, the accused was fined \$30 and costs of \$23.50 or 15 days in jail. On the second charge of driving without due care and attention he was given an adjournment until Dec. 7 for sentence.

The testimony of the accused completed the hearing on the first charge. McCoubrey in his evidence, stated that prior to the night of the incident, Aug. 11, he had been to a Saturday night dance at the New Glasgow Junior Farmer's Recreation Centre.

On the night of the disturbance, he stated that he had engaged a taxi and had left the dance at about 11:30 p.m. He stated that he had been in the taxi for about 15 minutes when he was stopped by the police.

On the second count, McCoubrey stated that he had been driving his car on the highway when he was stopped by the police. He stated that he had been driving at a speed of about 40 m.p.h. when he was stopped.

Magistrate Johnston sentenced McCoubrey to 15 days in jail for the first count and a fine of \$30 and costs for the second count.

Magistrate A.J. Haslam handed down two-year suspended sentences to Earl Clifford Roper, 19, East Rowley; Ralph E. Roper, 18, East Rowley; and Gerald Murray, 18, West Rowley.
