

Outstanding Pianist Coming To Community Concert Stage

Joseph Battista, a widely acclaimed concert pianist will play for the Community Concert Association in Summerside and Charlottetown next week. He performs at Summerside on Monday, April 6 at the Civic Auditorium. His performance for the Community Concert Association in Charlottetown is on the following night.

Born in Philadelphia of parents who had come to America from Italy, Joseph Battista started winning prizes at school and kept right on! While he studied he supported himself. There were eleven in the Battista family and a meagre budget. But Joseph managed. He played in music halls and restaurants and took summer jobs at resort hotels where he soon developed a handsome jazz technique.

TO BRAZIL
A year before Ar. Erica entered the war, in order to further good will between the United States and Brazil, Columbia Artists Management held a contest; the reward, a trip to Brazil and a

tour of the country arranged through the pianist Guipmar Novas. Joseph won this and sailed in July, 1941 to Rio de Janeiro as a musical emissary of his country — he remained two months playing before cultural societies, schools of music, colleges, etc. with symphony orchestras, and in recitals of his own. His success was outstanding everywhere.

On the threshold of international recognition, the pianist returned home — Pearl Harbour came, and before too long Battista was in uniform. For three years he turned his back on his career and gave his talents to a country at war.

His post-war career was launched in 1947 by a coveted engagement with the Boston symphony — later a recital at New York's Town Hall — followed by a tour of 60 concerts in the U. S. and Canada. In 1952 Battista returned to Brazil for a triumphal tour. His 1957-58 season was climaxed in August at concerts with the New Orleans Summer Symphony — on this occasion he was presented with the keys to the city and was made an Honorary

N. Rustico Man Given \$5 Fine

Charged with creating disturbance in a public place, by shouting and swearing, a resident of North Rustico, was fined \$20 and costs of 15 days by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., in Queens County Court, Friday afternoon.

Three-Handed Woman Found In Masterpiece

ANTWERP (Reuters)—Art experts have discovered that the famous Rubens painting of the Descent of Christ from the Cross in Antwerp Cathedral shows a three-handed woman.

The masterpiece, painted on wood by Peter Paul Rubens in 1612, normally hangs in an ill-lit transept in the cathedral. It was taken down recently to examine splits which have appeared in the wooden panels owing to their age.

Art experts noticed that Mary Magdalene, holding the feet of Christ's dead body, which is being taken down from the cross, appeared to have an extra left hand veiled by some draperies. They believe that Rubens originally painted Mary Magdalene with outstretched hands, but that he later changed his mind and painted the hands closer together. He then painted draperies on top of one left hand to hide it.

Question Site Of New Penal Institution

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Corrections Association has mildly questioned the federal government's wisdom in deciding to build a new penal institution at Springhill, N.S.

In its March bulletin to association members, the CCA notes that Justice Minister Fulton informed the Commons March 4 that Springhill — scene of a disastrous mine cave-in last year — has been chosen as a site for a new institution.

"The wisdom of locating an institution of this nature in a location such as Springhill might be questioned," the bulletin says.

It lists three disadvantages of such "isolated spots" for a penal institution: Too far from clinical services for helping prisoners toward rehabilitation; staff, particularly technical staff, are hesitant
