The late Princess Alice.

A London cable to the Herald says, "Alice, Grand Duchess of Hesse, Princess of Great Britain and Ireland; Recollections of her life, with selections from her letters," is the full title of a work which will be published in a few weeks at Darmstadt. It throws a new light on the amiable character of Queen Victoria and her family, but is silent on the Queen's political views. The editor heads it "Trials," and prefaces it with the following words written by the Princess:—"May the hour of trial and grief bring a blessing with it and not come in vain. The day passes quickly when one can do good and make other people happy, so much remains undone." Death fell on the household with passionate grief. The young mother lost her children. Louis Buchner, her most intimate friend, was taken from her. Her delicate health was affected and she was worn out with sorrow. She wrote "the journey of life becomes easier the more the number of those we love increases in Heaven." Then she, too, was laid at rest beside her children.
