Summerside High Holds Graduation

SUMMERSIDE — R.T. Hen- thorn, vice-president of R.T. Holman, Ltd., in his address to the graduates of Summerside High School last night, compared the different stages in their lives to book 1 (setting the stage) book II (breaking the sod) and book III (reaping the rewards).

"Everything that happens to us as we travel along life's highway moulds us into what we are today," the speaker said. In book I which you are closing tonight, you pick up the phobias and prejudices of past experience and must learn cor- rectly in book II the things you learned wrongly as a child.

"Everybody, teachers, par- ents and other associates, are teaching you in book I. In book II you must open your minds and cultivate the gift of select- ivity — examine your former beliefs in the light of new knowl- edge that has come to you. You must develop your talents to the utmost. Your big pro- blein will be: "what am I so- ing to do with my life?"

"Don't go to college simply for the sake of going to col- lege," the speaker emphasized. "Make sure that college training fits into the pattern of living you wish to weave for yourself."

The speaker was introduced by W. Chester S. MacDonnell, chairman of the board of school trustees.

The principal, David Lid- stone, chaired the exercises, and prizes, diplomas, and cer- tificates were presented by Dr. James Saunders, Keith Lopp and William Jay, members of the school board. Clive Darby delivered the valedictory.

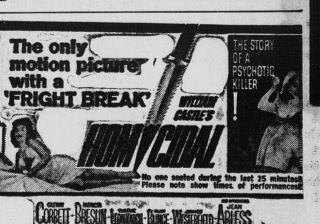
