## Foresters Chief Pays Visit

Mr. S.C. Berridge of Mission, British Columbia, High Chief Ranger of the Canadian Order of Foresters, visited the Island to meet with the members of the five subordinate lodges at the Charlottetown Hotel on Tuesday evening. He was accompanied here by Mr. J.W. Davies, Superintendent of Fieldmen, from the head office at Brantford, Ontario and Mr. J.L. Sturdy, District Manager, Moncton. This is Mr. Berridge's first official visit to Charlottetown since his election as head of the society. The three officials left yesterday for district meetings at other Maritime centers including Newfoundland.

## Agriculture Federation Takes Exception To New Potato Marketing Board

Complaint that the new Potato Marketing Board setup runs counter to the intent of Federal legislation and with the accepted principles of producer-controlled marketing was made in a statement released yesterday by the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture, following a meeting of the organization's directors. The statement reads as follows:

"The Board of Directors of the Federation of Agriculture has considered the implications of recent government action in making 3 new appointments to the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board and in suspending Sections 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 of the Potato Marketing scheme, sections which provide for the election of members to the Board in a democratic way.

"The Federation is with some regret under the necessity of advising the public that a Potato Board as presently constituted is not in keeping with accepted principles of producer controlled marketing. Reasons for this attitude are set out as follows:

"(1) The intent and purpose of marketing legislation is to place control in the hands of producers. The Potato Board as presently constituted is a government Board and is not responsible for its actions to the growers.

"(2) The Federation has urged and requested that the Potato Board be composed entirely of bona fide producers. This would appear to be a natural concept to the intention of potato dealers to set up an incorporated organization of their own as announced on or about November 5, 1954.

"(3) A number of the new members on the Potato Board have failed to support it in the past and have been opposed to marketing legislation in principle.

"(4) The apparent wishes of a majority of producers as expressed in two plebiscites have been disregarded.

"(5) Federal support for the potato industry would appear to be predicated on there being a recognized agency of the producers to bargain on behalf of the industry.

McNeill, Little Sand; Frank Jardine, Wilmot Valley; R.A. Profit, Freetown; Wallace Mallett, Union Road; Colin Waugh, Wilmot Valley; and Mrs. Willard Lank, Royalty.

S. C. Stewart and Son had second and third placing for a sow farrowed prior to Jan. 1955, a third for a sow farrowed in 1955 and over four months and a third in the bacon hog class 180-210 lbs.

Lorne Ferguson, Craipud took third place for junior boar. Herman Mayne of Emerald had a second and third placing. Roy MacQuarrie had a second and Ralph Myers a third.
