MASON AND GARDNER CO-STAR IN ABSORBING DRAMA

—There is absorbing entertainment on the Capitol screen in M-G-M's "Pandora and the Flying Dutchman," co-starring James Mason and Ava Gardner in the fascinating story of a beautiful American girl who, while living in Spain, falls in love with a mysterious Dutch painter and finds her fate inexorably held in his hands.

—Filmed on location in magnificent Technicolor, against the picturesque, mountain-fringed Costa Brava of northeastern Spain, the story's action engenders excitement in a series of cumulative episodes, among them a thrilling car-race trial speed run at 250 miles per hour, ending with the car enveloped in flames; and breath-taking sequences in the bullring, climaxed when a matador involved in the heroine's life is gored to death.

—But while there is action, excitement and suspense in almost every reel of "Pandora and the Flying Dutchman," the story is primarily a modern juxtaposition of the famous legend of the 16th Century Dutch sea captain who murdered the wife he thought unfaithful and was condemned to roam the seas eternally, or until he could find a woman willing to give her life for him. The counterpart of these figures in the yacht-owning Dutch painter and the American girl, Pandora, who loved him enough to give up her life for him makes for a fascinating romantic drama laid against the color, pagantry and gypsy music of the Spanish scene.

MRS. WILLIAM CASELEY

—News of the passing to Higher Services of Mrs. William Caseley brought a distinct sense of loss to family and friends in Kelvin Grove and other communities where she was known.

Her death occurred on Wednesday, November 12th, at the Prince County Hospital where she had been a patient for the past eight weeks. Despite expert medical care and the best of nursing, several months of declining health and two major operations proved too much for the frail body, and the unconquerable spirit departed to join loved ones gone before.

A life-long resident of Kelvin Grove, where she was born on March 17th, 1878, elder daughter of the late Herbert Hogg and his wife, Barbara Stewart, she was christened Margaret Elizabeth, and married William Henry Caseley, who predeceased her in 1937.

A lover of home and family, she was quiet and unassuming, loyal in all her contacts, a faithful member of the United Church, a life member of the Women's Missionary Society, and a member of the Women's Institutes. The funeral was held on Friday, November 14th, from Kensington United Church, following a short service at her late home, and was very largely attended. The Rev. L. M. Murray, B.A., B.D., conducted the service, and gave an inspiring address, based on the text found in Second Timothy, chapter 4, verses 6 and 7—"For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the Faith." The church choir led in the hymns, "The Lord's My Shepherd," "What a Friend we have in Jesus," and "When the Day of Toil is Done." The large concourse of friends gathered to pay their last respects and the many beautiful floral offerings, paid silent tribute to the respect in which she was held.
