Some of the Island's finest potatoes were shown with competition keen in every group. Top award for Irish Cobblers (seed) went to Mr. Daniel MacLean. The first place for Kalahdin (seed) went to Mrs. Pius Campbell, Little Harbour, who also won the award for the best samples of seed potatoes, any variety. The first place for a peck of potatoes, seed, any other variety than those enumerated, went to Mr. Ian MacGregor, with Mr. Joseph A. MacDonald taking both second and third spots.

There was a splendid showing of flowers ranging all the way from cut flowers in a wide variety to potted plants and some of the cooking on show had most of the men washing it were not kept in a wire cage.

Livestock Exhibits Among the many exhibitors of cattle were Robert White and Son, Rollo Bay; W. W. Anderson and Son, St. Peter's; Henry Mallard, Gowan Brae; James McInnis, Gowan Brae; Brent Stead, Bay Fortune; there were also several members of the Ayrshire and Holstein Calf Club showing animals in the open classes and several took part in the yearly judging.

The champion bacon hog of the show was an animal shown by Mr. Ernest Peters, Rollo Bay, who also won several other top awards with his swine. The champion Holstein female was from the herd of Charles MacDonald, Souris River, while the Reserve title went to Howard Dixon, Rollo Bay. Mr. MacDonald also took the male championship. The animals were judged by Mr. Cecil Stewart, Hampshire, with Mr. Edward Boswell, Victoria, judging the Ayrshires. In the latter class the champion male was shown by Mr. John Gillis, Forest Hill, and the champion female by Edwin Reid and Son, Rollo Bay.

Baptist Church Re-opened At Dundas

*Sunday, September 6, was a red letter day in the history of the Dundas - Annandale Baptist Church. On the evening of that day a capacity congregation gathered to rededicate the beautiful church building.

For the last few weeks skilled workmen have been beautifying both the interior and exterior of this historic shrine. The result of their labors is a church building completely transformed. The whole surface of the walls and ceiling of the interior of the building has been covered with a white satin finish paint, trimmed with gold. A new carpet has been placed in the pulpit and the aisles re-laid with linoleum. Choir chairs, pulpit, and pews have been revarnished and all parts of the sacred edifice renovated.

The outside of the church now presents a most attractive appearance having received new coats of yellow paint with white trimmings. The members and congregation of the Dundas Baptist Church may well be proud of the new appearance of their house of worship.

The service of re-dedication was conducted by Rev. E. J. Barras who took as the theme of his sermon "The Greatest Building On Earth", the text being "He built His sanctuary like high places." In the sheep class the champion ram title was won by Ernest Underhay, Bay Fortune, who also had the champion ewe in the Cheviots. The championship in the Oxford or Shropshire ram class went to Howard Norton, Annandale, who also had the champion ewe Reg. The champion ewe Grade was owned by Henry Mallard and Sons, Gowan Brae. Champion ram of the show was won by Ernest Underhay who also showed the best shearing ram. Howard Norton had the best shearing ewe and the champion ewe of the show while the champion grade ewe crown was taken by Henry Mallard and Sons. Preston Brympton had first and second places in the champion market lamb class.

4-H Achievement Day Results At Souris

The morning yesterday at the Eastern King's Exhibition at Souris was taken over by the 4-H Clubs. The following clubs held their achievement days: Coronation Holstein Club, Fortune Bridge and vicinity, Flying Enterprises Ayrshire Club of Souris, Line Road North, Golden Arrows Holstein and Ayrshire Club of Gowan Brae and the Bear River Ayrshire Club.

Members of each club vied for honors in all classes especially the class known as the "Year's Work". In this class, prizes are given the members for their ability as livestock feeders and managers and for their interest in the club. The placings are determined by a system of points. The maxima points are as follows: 20 points for feed reports; 20 for the care of the calf; 20 for attendance and tests and 40 for the calf.

Mr. Cecil Stewart, Hampshire judged the Holsteins and Mr. Edward Boswell, Victoria, the Ayrshires. Both judges congratulated the members on their work. They pointed out that although a calf is placed elsewhere than at the top, it often is a fine calf and if it be given good care, may place higher another year.

Mr. Morris Deacon, King's County fieldman, stated that he was well pleased with the club show. He drew the attention of the members to the necessity of good feed reports. He asked the members showing the three best calves in each club to bring them to the Rural Youth Fair at the Exhibition Grounds, Charlottetown.
