The bidding:
North East South West
1♣ 1♠ 2♥ 2♠
3♥ Pass 4♥

Opening lead—four of spades. Defense is frequently said to be the most difficult department of bridge. The reason is that a dealer follows diagonal lines instead of the direct route across the table which exists during bidding and dummy play.

As an illustration of the diagonal approach to the defense, observe East's problem after he wins the spade lead.

The first thing East starts thinking about, once dummy appears, is how to get four tricks. All he sees, remember, is his own hand and dummy's. (This is the diagonal view.)

East makes these observations: The club suit is solid for declarer

More Selective Charities Urged

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Canadians cannot be expected to go on forever giving increased amounts to charities and other welfare groups, a committee of the mid-winter conference of the Community Funds and Council of Canada said Monday.

It said welfare organizations will have to become more selective in their services. The committee was dealing with the planning of community services.

Jean - Marie Martin, dean of Laval University, Quebec, said community chests have drawbacks and may not be able to number of separate appeals. He also thought the chests tend to put charitable drives in the hands of professionals and there may be a danger in their bigness.

A. M. Kirkpatrick of Toronto, executive director of the Ontario John Howard Society, said the chest appeal in Toronto produced in its first year 25 per cent more for charitable purposes than the separate associations had in their many appeals the previous year. He added, however, that a single appeal leaves 11 months of the year during which other agencies may spring up to tap the charity dollar.

CREDIT FIGURES

OTTAWA (CP) — Consumer credit outstanding on the books of sales finance companies declined to an estimated \$781,800,000 at the end of 1957 from \$800,000,000 at Nov. 30, 1957. However, the bureau of statistics said the year-end total represented an increase of 3.4 per cent over the corresponding figure of \$756,300,000 for 1956.

THAMES BANK FALLS

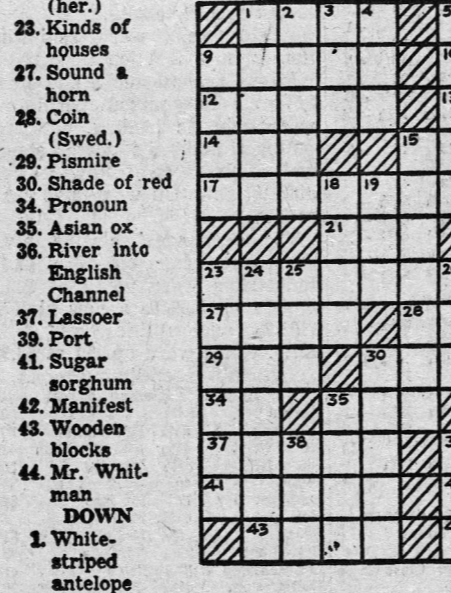
