Education In Traffic Safety Seen Need

A panel discussion on "jay walking and crosswalks" was the highlight of last night's annual meeting of the Metropolitan Committee held in Room 66 of Prince of Wales College. Moderator was Metro president M.F. Hagan. Panelists were J.A.

Gallant, registrar of motor vehicles; Philip Barlow, provincial examiner; Staff-Sgt. A.J. Dowling of the Metropolitan Police; Cst. John Norton, Sherwood; Cst. Harley Ings, Parkdale and RCMP traffic supervisor, Cst. E.G. Bishop.

The panelists provided a most interesting and informative discussion. Staff-Sgt. Dowling spoke of the serious problem of jaywalking in certain areas of the city such as Queen Street and Great George Street. "The worst thing about it is that there is no by-law to prevent it," he said. "The only law covering it now is that the pedestrian must give

the right-of-way to motorists in the street, but if the driver hits a pedestrian, he is responsible just the same". He commented on the installation of the new walk and wait signs on the corner of Queen and Grafton Streets, pointing out their usefulness to pedestrians and motorists.

SAFETY COUNCIL? J.A. Gallant said he felt that a program of the national safety council should be adopted in the province, as P.E.I. is the only province that has no safety council. He suggested that farmers groups and Women's Institutes could play a large role in educating the public in traffic safety.

Philip Barlow stated that many drivers don't know certain rules because they didn't know them when they were pedestrians, pointing out the need for pedestrian education. Constables Norton and Ings outlined how Sherwood and Parkdale were attempting to educate citizens in traffic safety.

Cst. Bishop briefly outlined how the RCMP was promoting the education of the public in traffic laws. Following the panel a film was shown on traffic safety, and the meeting was open for any discussions on the film. Retiring president M.F. The decision to erect the building was reached during a special meeting called for this purpose Wednesday.

The new home will be added as an extension to the east end of the proposed St. Dunstan's Basilica Recreation Centre on Richmond Street, construction of which is planned this year.

Plans for the home, drawn by architect Peter McNeill, were approved by the special meeting, and call for a two-floor extension located above a basement extension of the recreation centre.

Each floor will be 80 feet by 55 feet, with the main or second floor comprising a council room, offices, lavatories, group rooms and lounge. The third floor will include an assembly

hall, kitchen, rest rooms and store rooms.

HOME INADEQUATE The council decided to build because it was felt the present home on Water Street is now inadequate to meet the needs of an expanding membership and increased activities. The new home will provide additional and enlarged facilities for members. It is expected that the new quarters will be occupied in early 1963.
