Covers Cabinet

FREDERICK (CP) — The first major cabinet changes since the Liberal party won power in Nova Brunswick in 1960 were announced Monday night by Premier Louis J. Robichaud. Four ministers were removed. R. Ernest Richard, recently appointed minister without portfolio, will become minister of the newly formed fisheries department. Donald Harper, minister without portfolio and chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, will become provincial secretary. Daniel A. Riley, recently appointed minister without portfolio, will succeed Mr. Harper as NBPEC chairman. Mr. Riley will be minister of the newly constituted department of finance and industry.

Traffic Accidents

Three persons died in traffic accidents in this province over the holiday weekend. One died at 7:30 in City Hall. Another accident Saturday sent two persons to hospital in Summerside when two vehicles collided at the intersection at Broadbald. Mr. and Mrs. Leigh Maxwell, Port Hill, were taken to hospital but not believed seriously injured. The driver of the other vehicle was Roy Elwood MacLennan. He was not hurt. A car-tractor crash at Kingston occurred yesterday at approximately 5:30 p.m. The tractor was killed Saturday night when in collision with another vehicle near Southport Motel. The RCMP also reported several other minor accidents such as dented fenders and scratches.

Fire Situation  
Has Improved  
In N.S., N.B.

All forest fires in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were reported extinguished or under control Monday but there were fears that dry air sweeping in from the west may create new hazards. Thundershowers Sunday night halted the rapid spread of a major fire in the northern part of New Brunswick's Chatham County after it had burned over 65 acres of slash and small timber. Forty men moved in to put the finishing touches on the blaze Monday.

Efforts Are Deadlocked

LONDON (AP)—Britain and the Soviet Union reached a dozen-day agreement in efforts to bolster the shaky peace in Laos. Britain blamed the Russians for the stalemate. A statement said the Russians tried to hold the United States and rightist forces in the southeast Asian country. Neutralist forces in the Laotian plain de Jarres felt the attack last April by the Pathet Lao under the leadership of Deputy Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma.
