

## Parking Question Looms Large In Police Record

Two hundred and eleven parking violation tickets were placed on cars in Summerside during the past month and only two of these ignored the instructions to pay the \$1.00 violation charge. Warrants were issued for a court appearance which cost the two offenders an additional \$10.00 in costs, according to the monthly report issued by Chief of Police Peter E. White, and submitted by Councillor William Jenkins at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council on Monday evening.

The report said that during the month a case of forgery was investigated and information laid and warrant issued, but the alleged offender had left the province. He was located in Vancouver within the course of a week, and was placed under arrest by the Vancouver police, but it was considered too great an expense to have him returned from that point. This case had a direct bearing on a break and enter case in which this very cheque was stolen.

### CRIMINAL CHARGE

After the police report had been read, Councillor W.E. MacCauley said that the forgery charge appeared to be a criminal charge and inquired as to whether the town had any responsibility in bringing the accused back for trial. Mayor Currie indicated that the town did not, and that this matter was the responsibility of the Attorney General's Department.

The report of the Police Department stated that the parking situation in Summerside seems to be worsening, and suggested that parking meters be installed in the parking lot on the old Town Hall site, also on First Street from Summer to Central, which is at present a one-way street.

### PARKING

The report said that this street is crowded at all times, with parked cars which are mostly workers' cars at the local garage, or town business employees. Improvements in the property across the street from the garage are being made to take care of the garage owned cars, and because this property will occupy the space used by Meteor Taxi, right through to Water Street, a recommendation was made that no license to this taxi stand be granted on Water Street.

The suggestion was made that because the town now owns fifteen feet or more in front of the Armory that the street be widened to take that in, and also that the same width be carried right through on the parking lot which would make it more uniform and would add greatly to the appearance of Summer Street. The police report also suggested that the Lot known as the Allen lot, adjoining the town square, be made into a parking lot and that meters be also installed on this property.

The trustees of the United Church have informed the Police Department that it is their intention to make a parking space for cars behind the church upon completion of improvements now being made.

A recommendation was made that an application for a taxi license to a resident on Fitzroy Street would not be granted because the area is in a residential district.

The report also suggested that a fixed number of taxi licenses be granted so that taxi-owners will be able to earn a reasonable amount for their occupation.

### SPEED CLOCK

The speed clock has already been put into operation the report said, and an offender had already been fined in the courts for speeding. It is the intention of police to operate the clock several times a week so that unnecessary speeding will be eliminated. Parking meter collection for the month amounted to \$473.31, and fines amounting to \$1,200.00 were levied on the Summerside Police Court amounted to more than \$1,240.

## Summerside Phones In Tune

Many queries have been heard over the past few days regarding the new type ringing tones and busy line tones heard on Summerside telephones recently. The explanation as supplied by Earl Smith, maintenance foreman of the Summerside plant is this:

The ringing tones and busy line tones heard locally for the past seven years were tones originated from an English type tone inducer which came to Summerside in 1950 with the conversion of our system from manual to automatic dial service.

The various types of tones from the two ringing machines in the Summerside central office were changed last week so that they would be standard with other telephone exchanges in Canada which employ Northern Electric equipment. This change will take the tones at Summerside more familiar to other long distance operators throughout Canada and thus make long distance telephone service in general more efficient.

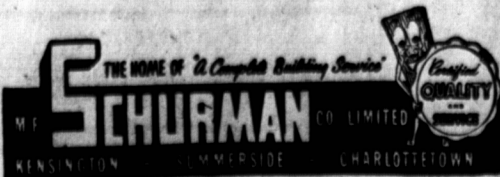
