PLEBISCITE MAKING TROUBLE

Important Departmental Changes Outlined.

Our Mr. Davies Slated for Minister of Justice.

OTTAWA, May 31.—The Government is having trouble over the plebiscite matter. Methodist district meetings now taking place in Ontario are passing resolutions condemning the back-handed stroke at the prohibition cause, and it is supposed that the annual conferences, which are about to take place, will pass still stronger resolutions.

The Solicitor-General gives notice of a bill repealing the act constituting the office of Controller, and making further changes in the Department's offices. No details are as yet given out, and there is much conjecture as to the scope of the measure. The notice itself only mentions the repeal of the act creating the controllership, but it is possible that the measure may effect the Department of Trade and Commerce, otherwise it will still further increase the number of Cabinet Ministers and departmental heads.

While it is not safe to prophesy unless you know, it need not surprise readers of THE EXAMINER to learn that Sir Richard Cartwright is not going to be High Commissioner but Minister of Finance, that Mowat will be Governor of Ontario, Davies Minister of Justice, Fielding Minister of Marine, while the Controllers are raised to position of Ministers.

If these changes take place probably they will be deferred to some time after the close of the session, but the Controller will assume the status and receive the salary of Ministers as soon as the bill receives assent.

It is announced that arrangements for the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass Railway have been completed between the Government and the Canadian Pacific Company.

A Disastrous Accident.

PISA, Italy, May 31.—During special services in the cathedral upon the occasion of the unveiling of an image of the Virgin a candle fell setting fire to the building and causing a great panic. Nine people were killed.

LONDON, May 31.—The Prince of Wales has expressed a desire that Crown Prince Constantine come to London for the jubilee. This is regarded as indicating England's good will towards Greece.

Elected by Acclamation.

MONCTON, May 31.—Mayor Robertson has been elected to the Local Legislature for the seat vacated by Mr. Killam. There was no contest.

Sudden Death at Amherst.

AMHERST, May 31.—Arthur Davison, aged 53, died on Saturday. He was Clerk of the County Court.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

EL PASO, Texas, May 29.—The flood situation is deplorable, but everything possible is being done to aid the sufferers. Tents have been secured from the government.

HALIFAX, May 29.—The fishery cruisers are having a lively time in this vicinity just now. There are 125 sail of American fishing schooners operating among the mackerel between Halifax and Prospect, and the cruisers are watching them closely.

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Col., May 29.—Two men were killed and a number of others were seriously bruised and cut today in a collision between a freight and a passenger train which was caused by an open switch. All the blame for the accident seems to attach to the brakeman of the freight train who left the switch open.

BRUSSELS, May 29.—Le Soir announces the coming betrothal of the Prince's Clementine, third daughter of King Leopold to Prince Albert Leopold Clement, son of Count Philippe of Flanders. The princess was born July 30, 1872, and Prince Albert on April 8, 1875. The princess is heir presumptive to the throne of Belgium.

LONDON, May 29.—The correspondent of the Times at Athens says: "Having formally accepted the autonomy the government will abstain from advising the Cretans to resist Europe. M. Ralli, however, told me today (Friday) that it could not be expected that Greece would help on the adoption of the programme of Europe, as Greece could not undertake to be Europe's gendarmes. He said that having advised the Cretans to abstain from all offensive movements against Mohammedans Greece must now leave Crete to settle her affairs with Europe."

LONDON, May 29.—Yesterday twenty-six Irish members of parliament adopted a resolution declaring that the Irish parliamentary party is unable to take part in the celebration of the Queen's Jubilee on the ground that the demonstration is not simply commemorative of the private and public virtues of the monarch, but is mainly an imperial jubilee over the development of the principles of self-government and the growth of prosperity, wealth and comfort, etc., which Ireland has not shared.
