### SEX LITERATURE BAN SUGGESTED

## Guest Speaker Stresses Need Of Sex Education

A suggestion that all sex literature be banished from local news stands was made at a meeting of Sherwood Home and School Association last night. The suggestion was voiced by one of those who heard guest speaker Dr. Frank A. Burke of Charlottetown speak on "sex education at home or in the school."

The guest speaker, introduced by Donald Gordon, said he was in disagreement with the suggested withdrawal of all sex literature because similar material could easily be procured through various mailing houses. "Our basic problem is sex education and if we withdraw all sex literature we would still be faced with the problem of sex education among our youth," said Dr. Burke.

The doctor mentioned 44 cases of gonorrhoea, which were reported to the department of mental health last year. "These 44 represent only a small amount of the number of actual cases," he said.

### DISEASE PREVALENT

"Gonorrhoea is most prevalent in teenagers between the ages of 15 and 19 which represents a lack of sex education among our youth," the speaker continued.
