GETS ROARING WELCOME

Queen Pledges Support In West Berlin Struggle

BERLIN (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II got a roaring welcome in West Berlin Thursday. She took a look at the Communist wall dividing East and West Berlin and as thousands cheered pledged British support for West Berliners.

Mayor Willy Brandt and City Assembly Speaker Otto Bach repeatedly had to interrupt their introductory speeches while the crowd cheered the Queen. Elizabeth, looking slightly awed by the unaccustomed ardor, smiled and waved under the red and gold canopy erected for her in front of the city hall.

Two Wounded As Quartet Robs Que. Credit Union

MONTREAL (CP)—Two persons were shot and wounded, one seriously, when a quartet of hooded men held up a suburban caisse populaire (credit union) Thursday and escaped behind hostages through a line of armed police.

The second wounded person was a man whom the hoodlums apparently mistook for a policeman. He was shot in the stomach. Police had been tipped of a possible bank robbery in the area, St. Leonard de Port Maurice, and were quickly on the scene when the alarm was sounded.

Two Young Canadians Solve Satellite Spin

OTTAWA (CP)—Two young Canadian scientists have solved the problem of why the American Echo II satellite spins and thereby may have exerted enormous influence on the future United States program for space platforms.

The defence research board scientists, John Mar, 32, of Fort Albert, B.C., and Ottawa, and Frank Vigneron, 25, of Eston, Sask., said Thursday in an interview that their solution may also be a possible explanation for the origin of the spin of the planets.
