City of Ghent—The steamer City of Ghent, Capt. McNevin, arrived here from Halifax last evening with a general cargo, discharged and left at 4 o'clock this morning for St. John's, thence to Halifax. Her outward cargo consisted of hay, pork and canned meats.

Case Dismissed—The summons against Eben Houston, of Brackley Point, for selling intoxicants at the Cymbria Park race, was today dismissed for the want of evidence. The case was tried before H. James Palmer, Stipendiary Magistrate for Queen's County.

Staircase's Movements—The Stanley left for Pictou at seven o'clock this morning, and is expected here on return about half past four this afternoon.

The Northumberland and St. Lawrence are moving at noon at St. Lawrence, and leaves here at eight o'clock each morning.

Social—A most pleasant social was held in O'Brien's Hall last evening, under the auspices of W. H. Lodge. A splendid programme of vocal and instrumental music, readings, etc., was disposed of, and Grand Representative Bremner gave an interesting account of his visit to the session of the Grand Lodge at Charlottetown.

Electors' Attention—The courts for the first revision of the Dominion electoral lists in King's County will be held shortly, and we are pleased to learn that in the southern and western section of the county, such good work was done at the preliminary revision by the Liberal-Conservative party, that very little remains to be attended to. We are sorry, however, to understand that the eastern and northern parts of the county are not in so satisfactory a condition. We hope that our friends in that section will not fail to see that the interests of the Liberal-Conservative party are not neglected at the final revision.

Was Badly Used—Captain Daniel Finlay, of the schooner Hasty, before reported wrecked at Pollock's Cove, C. B., writes to the Halifax Herald, complaining of the way he has been treated by some of the people of that place. He says that after his schooner got ashore he made an attempt to save the cargo, but as fast as it was put on the beach it was carried away by the inhabitants of that cove, who began to cut and break up the schooner to get at the cargo. He adds that he was quite at the mercy of the gang of pirates, who pillaged the vessel of everything on board, even to his clothes. He threatens to have the matter reported to the Government in order that the wreckers may be prosecuted.

County Court—The sittings of the December term of the County Court of Queen's County will be held as follows:—1st Circuit at Filton, Belfast, on Tuesday, 4th December. 2nd Circuit at Bushaw, on Friday, 7th. 3rd Circuit at Dunstaffnage, on Tuesday, 11th. 4th Circuit at New Glasgow, on Friday, 14th. 5th Circuit at Clifton, New London, on Tuesday, 18th. 6th Circuit at Charlottetown, on Wednesday, 20th. Saturday, 15th December, instant, is the last day for issuing summonses for Charlottetown sitting of the County Court.

Concert at New London.—We learn that preparations are being made for a grand concert at New London, to be held in the Courtroom at Clifton at the December sitting of the Court there, at which Judge Alley will preside. From what we do learn this concert will be the concert of the season. The programme will consist of choice readings and recitations and vocal and instrumental music of a high order. The instrumental music will consist of performances on the organ, violin and lute. Mr. Blanchard, of Charlottetown, and other skilled musicians will take part. Judge Alley and Messrs. Warb, Iron, M. Kenzie and Smith from Charlottetown will contribute readings and recitations. A number of local performers will also take part, and altogether the affair promises to excel all the concerts for which New London has been famous.

PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor Addresses the Students and Presents a Medal.

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor has ever taken a kindly interest in matters pertaining to the education of our people, and it is pleasing indeed to observe that this interest has in no wise diminished since his elevation to the high and honorable position which he now occupies. His Honor is a firm believer in Canada, and has the fullest confidence in its future. He never loses an opportunity of doing what lies in his power to inculcate a true spirit of patriotism into the young, of impressing upon the youthful mind the fact that in Canada they have a splendid country and a glorious heritage. Would that there were more such men.

A few weeks ago His Honor visited the city schools and the convents and presented each with a copy of that patriotic song "Hurrah for Canada." At the same time promising a medal for the best essay on "Canada and its Resources." As a consequence, every schoolboy who can strike the air (and some who cannot) may be heard humming the words of the song and thus sounding the praises of Canada, while many are hard at work studying the history of the country with a view to competing for the medal so kindly offered for the essay.

Yesterday afternoon His Honor visited the Prince of Wales College and amplified the good work he had already done in this respect by presenting that institution with a copy of the song and offering a gold medal to the student writing the best essay on "Canada." In making the presentation His Honor delivered an address to the pupils that was brimful of kindly advice and words of wisdom. After some opening references to his own school-boy days, and pointing to the advantages the youth of the present day enjoyed in the matter of acquiring education, he paid a glowing tribute to this Canada of ours, and strongly advised the pupils to become familiar with its history. We have, said he, a great country—a country of which we should all be proud. It is a land of seemingly inexhaustible resources and great expanse of territory. Its constitution is excellent, and there is no position to which the humblest may not aspire. He urged the students before him to cultivate a spirit of patriotism, to take an interest in their own country and become familiar with everything worth knowing concerning it. He pointed out that they had good teachers and every facility for acquiring information and a good education. Mr. Laird, a former student at the Prince of Wales College, had gone abroad, and was now a professor in one of the leading seats of learning in the neighboring Republic. Professor Schurman, another old student, was now President of Cornell University, and there was any number of Island students at other universities who were giving good accounts of themselves. The students of the present day had the same educational advantages that those whom he had named enjoyed, and those greater. They should all seek to emulate them, and endeavor, if possible, to do even better than they had done. In conclusion he expressed the hope that before his term of office expired some attempt would be made to erect a more commodious College building than the one they now possess. He also advised the students to cultivate a broad Christian-like spirit, and to always be kind and friendly towards one another.

After the applause which followed these remarks had subsided, Dr. Anderson, in a few appropriate remarks, returned thanks on behalf of the teaching staff and students to His Honor for his very kind and forcible address, which he trusted would bear good fruit. He also returned thanks for the song and medal, and trusted that the students would lose no time in beginning work on the essay for which the prize was so kindly presented.

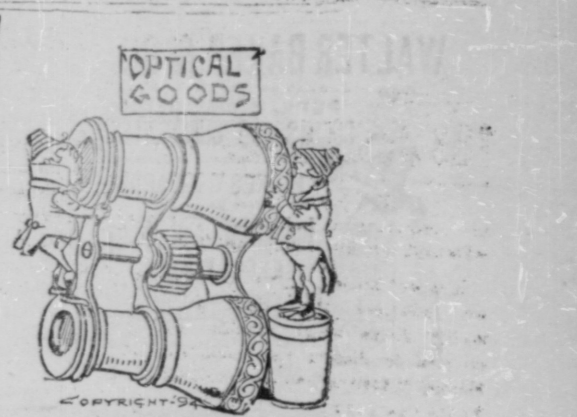
