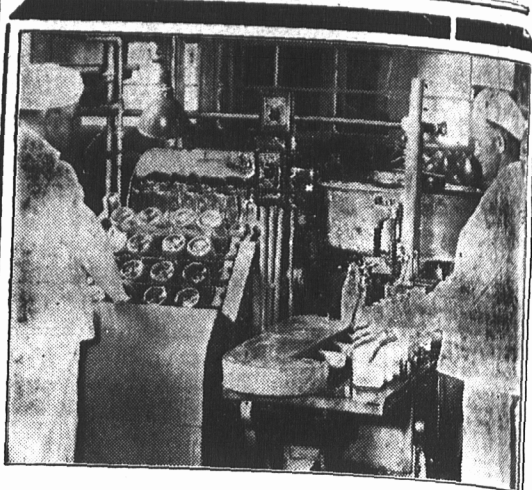

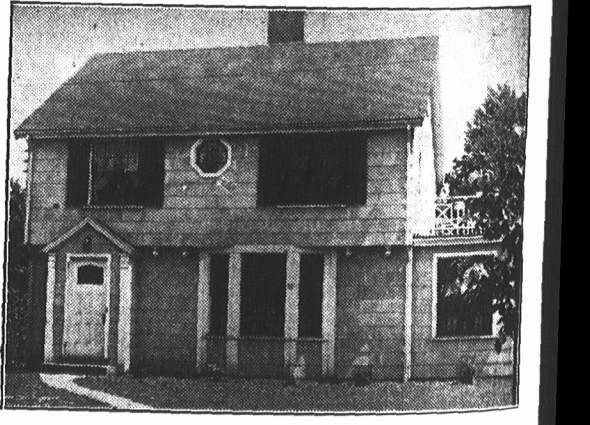

Heavy Purchase Of Canadian Wheat By Britain Unconfirmed

OTTAWA, Aug. 30. (CP)—Rumors widely circulated today that Great Britain had made heavy purchases of Canadian wheat as a precautionary measure in the event war results from the present crisis went without confirmation or comment from Government or Wheat Board officials here. For nearly a week George McIvor, chairman of the Canadian Wheat Board which operates in Winnipeg but is under jurisdiction of the Department of Trade and Commerce, has been in Ottawa with members of his staff. Mr. McIvor came here to consult with Trade Minister Euler on marketing plans and the situation that might face the board in the event of war. It is assumed that Great Britain would need the bulk of available wheat in Canada if war came and that heavy purchases here even in the threat of war would not be surprising. But neither Mr. Euler nor the wheat board officials would give any details of the situation that may have already taken place nor the conclusions reached at discussions held in the last week.

Cooke "Loaned" To Aussie Squad

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30.—Eliwood T. Cooke, who cut quite a figure in the all-English championships at Wimbledon, is going to help line up Australia's big four for the Davis Cup challenge round against the United States here this weekend. Cooke no. 7 in the United States tennis rankings, was "loaned" to the Aussies for practice as a gesture of friendship between a Captain Walter L. Fife of the United States and Captain Harry Hopman of Australia. The new assignment for Cooke will in no way affect the status of Fred Perry, former English Davis Cup hero, as Australia's practice player. Perry was scheduled to arrive today for workouts. LUCKY THIRTEEN LONDON.—(CP)—Thirteen is a lucky number for the racehorse Erosion. In his first season of racing last year he did not win in seven starts. He lost five races this year, but in the 13th race, he led the field.
