"IN MAGISTRATE'S COURT" - At Georgetown yesterday before Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald, a resident of Hunter River pleaded not guilty to a charge that he did unlawfully obtain an automobile to the value of \$900.00 by falsely representing that he would return and pay the complainant the value received from the sale of said automobile in two or three days, contrary to section 405 Criminal Code. No evidence was taken but J. A. MacDonald, counsel for the plaintiff argued and cited cases to the effect that the information did not disclose a past or present misrepresentation, but contained only a promise of a future intent, and as such was not a false pretense. He stated further that the complainant, a resident of Murray River, had retained the right of ownership, so that there would not be a matter of false pretenses. He then moved that the information be dismissed. The case, on the advice of Crown Prosecutor S. S. Hessian, was adjourned to February 11th at 2:30 p.m. All other cases on the docket were also adjourned for one week.
