The prisons of Belgium are the best in Europe.

The assessment in New York city this year is at the rate of 2.53 per cent.

The Princess Louise is travelling, on the Continent, as Lady Sandridge.

Table cloths costing \$800 and \$1,000 each are the latest feature of fashionable extravagance in Gotham.

Mr. Gladstone and the Marquis of Hartington, Secretary for India, have gone to their country residences.

Extensive military preparations are being made in the west of Ireland, in view of apprehended disturbances.

A despatch dated Valparaiso, October 10, says:—"Chile and Peru have accepted the offer of mediation by the United States."

It is reported that gold to the amount of £600,000 was taken from the Bank of France on Monday, chiefly for America and Germany.

The German police are not merciful towards socialists. They do not respect privacy, and houses are searched upon the slightest pretext.

Sir Charles Dilke, Under Foreign Secretary, has arrived at Paris and visited M. Barthélemy St. Hilaire, the Minister of Foreign Affairs.

In one German city, Breslau, there are 3,000 people who do not receive their correspondence until it has been examined by the police.

A despatch to the Times from Rangoon says:—"The reports relative to the Burmese preparations for war are regarded as exaggerated and absurd. No serious trouble is anticipated."

A private telegram from Sydney states that great political excitement prevails in Queensland. The mail contract has been suspended. The Ministry is denounced and the opposition is strongly supported.

A German boy, who could not speak a word of English, travelled alone from his home in the fatherland to an Iowa town. He had on his breast a big placard with the words, "Please direct this boy to Monticell, Iowa."

Respecting the International Regatta the Sportsman says:—"We recently received a number of communications from oarsmen in training for the contests for the American prizes in the International Regatta pointing out that they had already commenced to train but had not yet had any guarantee that the American company would accept their entries. We accordingly wired the company, stating that the oarsmen were anxious to see the preliminaries settled, and we have received the reply that the president of the company is now on his way to England to settle matters. Hanlon, the oarsman, has gained three pounds, owing to inactivity during Saturday and Sunday, on account of the weather. He has a slight sore throat, but he looks very well. Elliott is in excellent health. He is considerably reduced in weight and rows in capital form."

The Londoners are still on the lookout for Lady Burdett-Coutts' marriage. A fashionable wedding took place about two weeks ago at the Savoy Church. The public have so vigilantly watched the building in expectation of the event that a few minutes after the arrival of the wedding party several thousand persons, including many of position, flooded the building and blocked all the approaches, when they discovered the happy couple, the bridegroom, a Frenchman, a relative of Mr. Goschen, and the bride, also a foreigner. The crowd, in angry disappointment, hissed the pair and their friends as they drove off. There is a rumor that certain interested parties hostile to the marriage of the Baroness are determined to interpose at the nuptial altar, and if they cannot prevent the ceremony to create a scandal.

The mediators lot is not a happy one. No more thankless duty can be imagined for the representative of a neutral nation than that of endeavoring to reconcile the conflicting pretensions of two countries engaged in wars fare. There must, of course, be mutual concessions, else the mediation would be indistinguishable from the capitulation of one of the belligerents. The original claims of the successful belligerent are, however, almost greater than could be justified by the completest victory, and, on the other hand, the unsuccessful belligerent invariably insists upon a decision in accordance with abstract justice as understood by itself. When, as in the case of the war between Chile and Peru-Bolivian alliance, the fortune of war has favored an ambitious and unscrupulous aggressor, the task of an American mediator becomes peculiarly unsatisfactory. It is vain to hope that Chile will be contented with anything less than the annexation of the rich mineral districts she has seized from her neighbors, and she will also stoutly insist upon a war indemnity and

upon humiliating conditions in respect to future armaments. Peru cannot accede to such conditions without ignominy and has no expectations of any good result from the American mediation, which she has accepted purely as a matter of form. Whatever the result of a successful mediation might be, it would be fraught with the bitterest recollections to Peru, and the sanction of American diplomacy attached to the record of her spoliation could not but prove an aggravation of her misery. It is to be hoped that the offer of mediation by Minister Christiancy will not be insisted upon, after the inevitable failure of his preliminary proposals.—New York Herald.

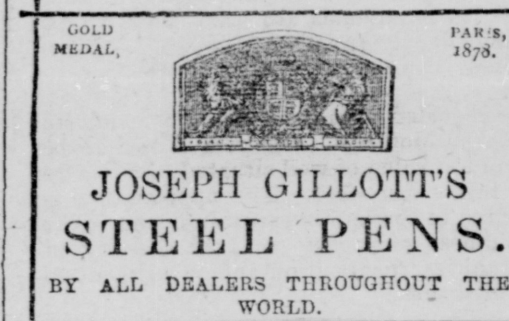
