A Gladstonian Victory.

Political Excitement in England.

LONDON, May 11. In the South Leicestershire election contest, Mr. Logan, the Gladstonian, defeated Hartly (Conservative) by 489 votes. At the last election the Gladstonian was defeated by 1158 votes. This is regarded as the most crushing defeat that Salisbury has suffered. There is great excitement in England.

MONTREAL, May 11. The C. P. R. express train went through a burnt bridge fifty miles west of Sudbury on Friday night. One man was killed and five injured. Two cars were destroyed.

WASHINGTON, May 11. The American Government has notified Spain that it will introduce a bill modifying the McKinley Tariff so as to facilitate the importation of Havana tobacco.

Anarchist Demonstration Suppressed.

PARIS, May 11. The police promptly suppressed an anarchist attempt yesterday to hold a demonstration, and have arrested the leaders.

NEW YORK, May 11. Eighteen thousand four hundred and fifty-seven immigrants landed at New York on Saturday.

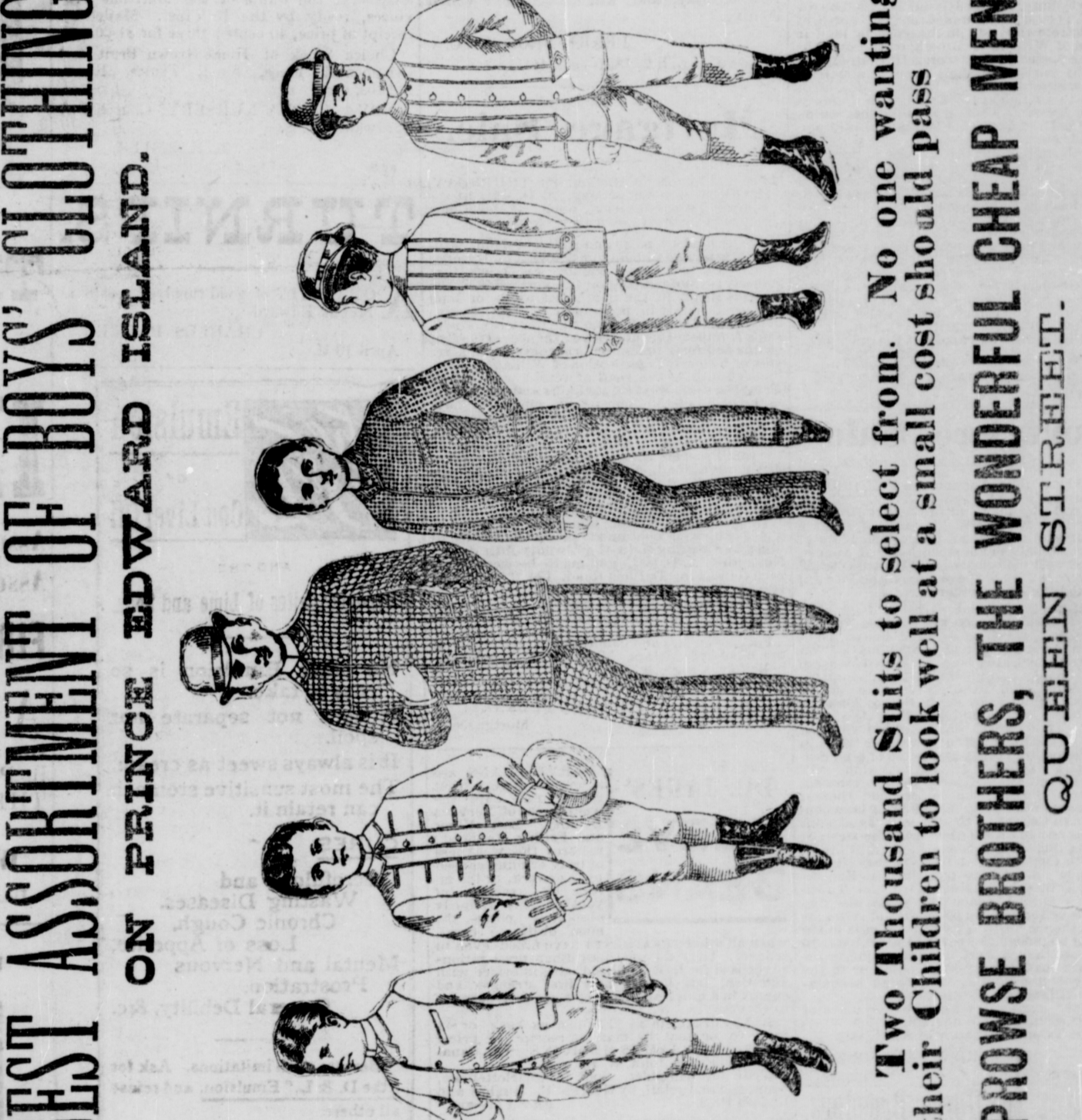
