NEWSY NOTES

Common salt, sodium chloride, they should be given only a limited amount of loose salt at first, or they may take an overdose at the start and cause indigestion. Those that favour supplying their stock with rock salt or salt blocks can always put up good arguments in favour of having salt licks for their animals. They say that cattle will be unable to take more than they should when it is in the form of salt blocks (produced under a pressure of 10,000 pounds per square inch). Careful experiments have shown that where milk cows were fed a concentrate with one per cent of salt while on pasture, and were given free access to loose salt, they consumed only a trifle more salt than another lot of milk cows fed similarly that had access only to salt blocks; when however, the total supply of salt was furnished to one lot as loose salt, these cows consumed almost twice as much salt as the lot of cows that had access only to salt blocks. The cows that ate less salt in this test, however, apparently had sufficient for their needs; because in both milk production and in body weight, they held their own with the others.

Salt For Domestic Animals The hunger for salt, if it is not provided, is much greater among the animals that live chiefly on plants than it is with animals that eat flesh; these carnivorous animals procure their salt requirements from the blood and flesh that they consume. Horses, sheep and cattle require much more salt than swine or poultry, cats or dogs. When swine or poultry are fed fish meal or tankage, their need for salt is greatly lessened. The salt requirements of animals vary with their location. The salt content of feeds grown in some localities is greater than in others. The drinking water in some areas may contain an appreciable quantity of salt, so that it may not be necessary to provide the animals with much salt from other sources. Animals on pasture in Prince Edward Island, that have access along the shores to salt water, may not require a supply from any other source.

Methods Of Supplying Salt There are many stockmen who favour giving their animals access to a supply of loose salt. Many farmers salt their hay as they place it in the mow, using ten to twenty pounds of salt per ton. Others mix a definite proportion of salt in the concentrate fed, and in addition have a supply where the animals can take what they desire. Small quantities of salt increase the palatability of poultry feeds. Some claim that salt is poisonous to poultry, and in overdoses it is deadly. We recall where a flock of pullets in New London once secured access, accidentally, to a quantity of salt herring, and most of the pullets died. Most poultrymen believe that a moderate amount of salt is beneficial.

Swine should have free access to a supply of salt, in addition to what is supplied to them in their daily ration. They require much less than other live stock, and care should be taken not to give them injurious amounts in their food. Salt may be added to a mixture of their protein supplements at two to three pounds to each hundred pounds of the mixture. This addition of salt is particularly valuable when the proteins are of plant origin, such as soyabean meal.
