FOOTBALL.—New Glasgow was scheduled to play the Wanderers at Halifax yesterday. The final match in the trophy series will be played on Thanksgiving Day.

SHIPPING continues brisk in all the by-ports of Prince County. Several square-rigged vessels and a number of large schooners are loading produce at Alberton for the West Indian, Provincial and American ports.

THE FASTNET.—The steamer Fastnet, Captain Pyc, arrived from Halifax at ten o'clock yesterday morning with a general cargo and five or six passengers. She left again at six o'clock with a miscellaneous freight and two passengers—Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Burbridge.

WENT TO BOSTON.—The steamer Britannia left Herrington for Boston on Tuesday afternoon. It is stated that the Britannia was recently chartered by parties for three cruises to the West Indies—in January, February and March—touching at Nassau, Kingston, Jamaica, Havana, Cuba and other nearby ports.

SCHOONER ASHORE.—The schooner Valiant, from Lunenburg, N. S., for Charlottetown, to load with produce for the United States, went ashore on Governor's Island reef while coming up last evening. She was towed off this morning by the steam tug William Aitken, and arrived here about noon to-day.

ISLAND OYSTERS.—The Moncton Times says: Mr. John D. Henderson a few days ago shipped to Sir Charles Tupper, Canadian High Commissioner in England, a barrel of P. E. Island oysters. The bivalves were raked near St. Eleonora, and were carefully selected for this shipment. They are said to be the finest barrel of oysters ever seen in Moncton. The shipment was made via Halifax.

A BLIND GUIDE.—If Erastus Wiman is as poor an authority as he makes himself on the ensuing political contest in the United States it is safe to say that he will make few converts. During his lecture in this city he several times alluded to the Presidential election coming off "on to-morrow (Friday) week," Nov. 4th. Everyone knows that the date for such elections is "the second Tuesday in November" and will be fought this year on the 8th inst.

SENT UP.—This afternoon H. V. Palmer, J. P., sent John McKinnon, of Rocky Point, up for trial in the Supreme Court on a charge of arson. The evidence given in this case has already been dealt with by THE EXAMINER. The Magistrate said that inasmuch as the evidence against McKinnon was not very strong he would accept bail for his appearance—McKinnon in \$100 and two sureties in \$50 each.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD.—The Truro Gold Mining Company are jubilant. On Monday evening G. W. Stuart arrived from their mine at Cariboo with a brick of gold 8 1/2 inches in length, 2 1/2 in width, 1 1/2 in depth, and weighing 260 odd ounces, worth \$5,000, obtained from 22 tons of quartz. It is the result of the work of 15 men for one month. Besides the brick Mr. Stuart brought specimens said to be valued at \$800. The lead is from two to 14 inches, and the principal "strike" will, it is said, yield \$1,000 to the ton.

SALVATION ARMY.—The Salvation Army will be shortly having their annual week of thanksgiving, prayer and self-denial. The dates are from November 1st to 12th, inclusive. One special feature of the self-denial week is an appeal which is made to every individual member and follower of the Salvation Army to deny themselves of some article of food or clothing, or in some way, so that without lessening their regular contributions they may be able to help the self-denial fund.

AGAINST THE CITY.—The city of Moncton has no less than six law suits pending. They are: Captain Newcomb, of Parraboro, for damages for the loss of his vessel, which he alleges was due to negligence of harbor officials; L. T. Joudry, for damages to his property, caused by the diversion of a natural drain on the Mountain road, so called; Thompson of Bass River, who sues for a share of the city reward of \$250 offered for the capture of the desperado "Jim," all of which was paid to Detective Carroll; Abraham Wilbur and Geo. H. Allen, who sue for false arrest for taxes; and Miss Woods, who sues for damages sustained from falling into a sewer excavation which it is alleged was not properly lighted and otherwise dangerous.

SCOTT ACT.—The Scott Act is again likely to become a burning question in Moncton. Last March a Scott Act council was elected, that is the mayor and four of the six aldermen were endorsed by the temperance people, but beyond a little spurt at the beginning of the year, things have moved along about as usual. The sale of liquor has been as open and defiant as ever, and for two or three months the customarily occasional Scott Act case has not appeared on the police court records. An effort is now being made by the temperance people to have an in-pet or appointed for the city. Deputations from the Sons of Temperance and the Temple of Honor recently waited on the Council to discuss the situation and press their claims. The whole matter will be fully considered at the next meeting of the board.

Prunty was fined \$4 without costs, and ordered to put the property in the position it was before he laid viol. hands on it. An accomplice of Prunty's will appear before H's Honor to-morrow.

News Notes.

Florida has begun to ship oranges to England. The continent to which they belonged was not enough for them.

She C. P. R. steamship Empress of Japan made seven knots an hour all the way from Yokohama to Victoria, B. C., and beat the Pacific record. She passed safely through the typhoon which wrecked the B-khara.

1892 will go on record as a bad one for the insurance companies. On top of their \$4,800,000 losses in S. John's comes \$3,250,000 by the Milwaukee fire. It takes a lot of policies to gather in eight millions in premiums.

Some Scotch farmers who went to Essex, England, to try their luck in a district where rents are low, are not satisfied. They sent a delegate to Canada who has reported favorably that in any part of it a man with from £1,500 to £2,000 could do well at dairying or mixed farming. Of the two hundred Scottish farmers in Essex, a number will, therefore, shortly come to Canada. They are a very desirable class.
