

THE LAST MEETING!

A public meeting was convened on Tuesday evening, in Waugh's Hall, to discuss "Free Trade and Reciprocity." After Mr. D. E. Boman was called to the chair, Finlay McNeill, Esq., moved a resolution to the effect that Free Trade would be beneficial to this Island, and he endeavored to show the benefits that would arise from Free Trade in its widest sense being carried into effect in this country. He was followed by several speakers, who took a different view of the matter, some of whom in very forcible language denounced the principle embodied in the resolution. After a lengthy debate, the resolution was put to the meeting and lost, a large majority voting against it. A resolution, the effect of which was, that the Government of this Island should enter into negotiations with the United States Government at Washington, to form a Reciprocity Treaty with this Province, was also submitted to the meeting. Quite an animated discussion took place on this resolution, when an amendment was proposed and carried almost unanimously, permitting the mover of the resolution to withdraw it. The question of Island Railroads was then brought up; in the debate that ensued the "boys" expressed their approbation and dissent a little too noisily. A resolution was then moved by Thomas Kelly, Esq., asking the Government to establish an office of Judge Probate, and a Registry of Deeds in Prince County. This resolution, being of a more practical nature than those previously submitted, recommended itself to the good sense of the meeting, and passed unanimously. We have not as yet heard when the next meeting is to be held.

THE Steamer "Princess of Wales" made her first trip to this port on Tuesday last. She has been newly painted and refitted, and presents quite a neat appearance. We were very glad to welcome our friend, Captain Evans, on the re-appearance of boat. The principal officers are Capt. E. Evans, Commander; Mr. Lund, Pilot; Mr. McCarty, Mate; Mr. Wm. Chandler, Steward. The travelling public can place the greatest confidence in those officers and the boat, as we believe no accident has yet happened with her. At the sound of the "whistle" when she came into the harbor, quite a large number of persons went down to welcome the return of the boat. On leaving she took from her about eighty barrels oysters, twenty head cattle, and several horses.

WE have devoted a large portion of our paper this week to the proceedings of the House of Assembly, as it will be interesting while the House is sitting. In order to do this we have been obliged to omit several advertisements, but we hope our patrons will pardon us. We will make amends when the rush of new advertisements of Spring Goods comes in.

Dublin, April 27. At the Fenian trials to-day Colonel Massey was brought on the stand. He made a clear breast of it, and told the whole story of the Fenian plot.

London, April 27. Queen Victoria has written a letter to the King of Prussia, in which she takes ground in favor of the recent and more moderate proposition of France, in regard to the disposition of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, and advises him to accept the plan of compromise to which the Emperor Napoleon is willing to accede.

Paris, April 27. It is officially stated that the Emperor has expressed satisfaction with the negotiations now in progress for the settlement of the Luxembourg question.

London, April 28. At a late hour last night the Prussian government signified its acceptance of the proposition made by the Queen of England for a general Conference at London, of the Great Powers, to settle the Luxembourg dispute on the basis of the neutralization of the Grand Duchy, guaranteed by all the powers represented at the conference.

St. Petersburg, April 27. It is said that the Russian government will receive from the United States a fleet of Iron-clads, instead of the stipulated sum of money in payment for the cession of the Russian possessions.

Londonderry, April 27. The steamship *Britannia*, which left New York April 13th, touched at Moville to-day, and sailed again for Glasgow.

London April 28, even. The General Conference of European Powers to settle the difference between France and Prussia, will meet in London on the 15th of May. It has been agreed that in the meantime the Fortress of Lombardy shall be dismantled.

London, April 29. Consols, 91 1/2; 5-20's, 70 1/2 Ex Div.

London, April 28. A cable dispatch to the *Herald* says the prize fight for the championship of England between Wormald and O'Balwin did not come off—the latter failing to appear. Gold 135 1/2.

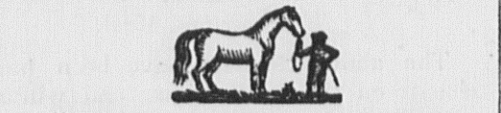
