Douglas Arrives Sun. On P.E.I. Tour

T. C. Douglas, New Democratic party leader, will arrive in Charlottetown Sunday night for a busy two-day visit to this province. It was learned from Thomas Dunphy, provincial organizer for the party, and federal candidate in Kings.

Mr. Douglas will speak in the Community Hall at Morell at 1.30 p.m. Monday. He will speak to the students in the Souris High School at 3.15, and meet an audience in the Souris Unit-

ed Church hall one-half hour later.

The national party leader will speak to a meeting in Summerside that night, and will make two appearances in Montague on Tuesday before leaving the province at 4.30 in the afternoon.

The Montague meetings include the 11.45 talk to the Montague High School students, and a Board of Trade luncheon meeting in the Bison restaurant at 12.30.

Accused Ordered To Stand Trial Before Supreme Court

At the conclusion of his preliminary hearing, Elmer Daniel O'Brien, Charlottetown, was committed to the next session of the Supreme Court for trial on the charge of breaking and entering with intent.

O'Brien, counselled by Lester O'Donnell, is charged with breaking and entering the Rail-

way Employees Club, 130 Richmond Street, Charlottetown, on the morning of Feb. 9, 1962.

The preliminary hearing was conducted before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, with Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McQuigun conducting the case for the Crown.

FIVE WITNESSES
At yesterday's session, the Crown called five witnesses to testify. Frank Hughes, Charlottetown, a CNR employee, and assistant steward at the club, told how the establishment was locked up on the night of Feb. 8.

Henry Gallant, retired CNR employee, steward of the club, stated that he had been called to the club at about 7.50 a.m. Feb. 9, at which time he found that the two locks on the entrance leading to the hallway and the lock on the door of canteen had been broken.

He also stated that six partly filled bottles and three full bottles of liquor and some cigarettes were missing from the canteen. The slot-machines and their top glasses broken out and a quantity of dimes and nickles removed.

Ralph Josey, Sr., testified to going to the building early on the morning of Feb. 9, and of meeting two men coming down the stairs leading to Richmond Street. He identified one of them as the accused.

FOUND DOOR OPEN
Reaching the second floor, where his wife operates a beauty parlor, Mr. Josey told of finding the door of the railway club room partly open and wood chips lying around on the floor. He then called the city police.

Deputy Chief of Police Stems Webster, related his part in the investigation, and of his search of the accused's person following his arrest. Deputy Webster said that in one of the pockets of the accused he found a number

Hubert Macdonald, Minister of Health, said at the graduation of laboratory technicians at the Charlottetown Hospital last night.

Dr. MacNeill stated, "We were fortunate in this province." Dr. MacNeill stated, "in that advantage was taken early of the financial help given by the laboratory and radiology federal health grant. This meant that a fairly extensive and comprehensive laboratory system had been built up and was functioning smoothly before hospital insurance came into being." He reminded the graduates of the ethical standards called for by their code of ethics. Referring to the need for experienced technicians, he stated, "I believe that the improvement in the salary scale put into operation last year should enable the retention of more of the present staff so that experience will be cumulative."

Dr. Craig congratulated the graduates on the achievement of the class in exams which resulted in a 30 per cent failure rate through Canada, noting the difficulties it faced following the fire which occurred at the health centre last year. He made special mention of Edward Gillis, who by writing the same exams as the regular class, merited his ART. Mr. Gillis previously held a special certificate in histology.

NO CAUSE FOR PANIC

"I don't think there is any reason to panic over the present price of potatoes. There may not be as many good potatoes in storage in the province as is thought. New Brunswick is suffering some blight damage and their starch diversion program is taking a large quantity of potatoes. Potatoes shipped out of this province are up by about 500 carloads over the amount shipped out last year and 200 carloads will be processed at Seaman Brothers plant at New Annan.
