The ship New Dominion, Kichham, master, sailed for England yesterday. She is a very superior vessel, and whether offered for sale or continued as a trader between Liverpool and Charlottetown, we hope she may prove to her owner—Hon. J. C. Pope—a remunerative speculation.

Mr. Coles took a short cruise in the Dominion Cutter La Canadienne, which was in our harbor last week, and proceeded nearly as far as Gaspe, when he found the Canadian Steamer Her Majesty proceeding to Shediac, with a valuable cargo of flour, wheat, meal, &c., on board of which he proceeded on his homeward journey to Shediac, and arrived there in the Princess of Wales on Saturday evening.

The name of the only survivor of the crew of the miniature Yacht John T. Ford, which was lost in the English Channel is Armstrong.

In a circular note the Soudine Porte announces to its Ministers of Foreign Courts that the war in the Island of Candia has been brought to a close and that a general amnesty has been granted to the insurgents.

Very Latest Telegrams!

Paris, Sept. 1. Baron Moustier of foreign affairs, has addressed a circular dispatch to the diplomatic representatives of France at the European Courts in regard to the existing relations of the Government with other Continental powers.

Alluding to the recent events, particularly to the Conference held at Salsburg, M. Moustier declares that this suspicious meeting of the Emperors of France and Austria should be regarded as a fresh pledge for the maintenance of peace in Europe.

BERLIN, Sept. 1. The elections which were held in this City on Saturday for members of the new Parliament of the North German Confederation, resulted in the success of the candidates of the Radical Party.

LONDON, SEPT. 3. The foreign office has issued a blue book containing the documents which have been issued in that Department in the Alabama case and the correspondence which passed between the Government of Great Britain and the United States for the settlement of claims. The latest despatch in the collection shows what progress has been made in the controversy and states the condition upon which the English Government is willing to attempt a final settlement.

The despatch is addressed by Lord Stanley Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to Sir Fredrick Bruce, British Minister at Washington and is dated May 24th.

Lord Stanley informs Sir Fredrick Bruce that England is willing to submit the claims of American citizens for damages caused by the Alabama and all other similar damages on the part of the United States to a Commission, the arbitration of claims of British subjects against the United States for losses suffered during the late war, being likewise submitted to the same Commission.
