RELIGION AND LIFE

"Every great thing has been done in spite of something." So comments an American writer of today on Moses' slowness of speech. When Moses was called to deliver Israel, he thought that the fact that he was slow of speech disqualified him for the job.

With God's help he succeeded in spite of his handicap.

St. Paul's "thorn in the flesh" would have kept most men at home; to the Apostle it was an occasion for God to give him by grace what nature had denied him.

There is not an aspiring youth in this hour who does not see formidable obstacles blocking the realization of his ambitions.

His destiny will be decided by the spirit in which he meets them.

"The sluggard says: 'There is a lion in the road';" the brave man considers the value of the lion's skin.

GLOWING HISTORY

The glowing history of human success is just a series of accounts of the overcoming of obstacles.

Every man's chief handicap is within—not without. It is spirit and not his environment that determines what he is to become and do. Someone has drawn attention to the fact that the Negro spirituals were sung in spite of their slavery.

It is not the direction of the winds that decided the course of either the old Mayflower or the new; the winds drove the vessel in the way the captain decided.

St. John Drinkwater wrote: "But Lord, the will — there lies our bitter need."

What the heart is to the muscles, character is to our gifts.

Strong muscles do not necessarily mean a strong man. One of the strongest men of our time strained his heart by a lift that helped a car out of a ditch. His muscles were equal to the strain but his heart wasn't, and he never was well again.

Similarly great gifts do not necessarily mean a great man. Some of our tragic failures have been men with ten talent mental ability and one talent moral character.

Educationalists now are doing well in emphasizing the special attention that should be given to gifted youth, but they err when they leave character out of account.

And we dare not take moral principle for granted.

I remember two boys who grew up together in a backward district. One was brilliant in his studies, and the other so slow that he seemed stupid.

But the slow of intellect had ironclad principles in control of his actions which the clever scholar lacked, and he rose to fame while the other disappeared.

Hence the importance of religion in education.

The storing and training of the mind will avail but little unless there is behind it the drive of a strong faith and high ideal.

How many men have attained and achieved wonders which their natural handicaps forbade?

Demosthenes is regarded as the greatest master of spoken speech in the history of the western world, but as a boy he had a serious defect in his speech.

MAGNIFICENT

This he overcame by declaiming against the waves with pebbles in his mouth, by speaking as he ran uphill, and by other methods that would seem ridiculous if it were not for their magnificent effects.

So in our time, the late Dr. J. A. MacDonald was determined to be an orator in spite of the impediment in his speech. He subjected himself to a drill that almost makes one shiver in order to attain his ideal.

No less an authority than principal Alfred Gandier said that he had had the privilege of hearing the famous British orators of his time, and that Macdonald at his best was greater than they. Even the limitations of his own nature cannot keep down the truly great in soul.

Neither can circumstances. People may argue — You can shape iron to serve the purpose you have in mind, but you cannot bend granite, and circumstances are immovable as bed-rock.

But even granite can be hewn into blocks and built into castles that defy the tides of time.

Circumstances certainly forbade the realization of Charles T. Currely's dream of founding a great museum in Toronto to "bring the ages home" to this young nation. But one man with a sense of the values in the past for a forward-looking nation and faith in God and man achieved the impossible, and his museum is our glory and an asset in education of priceless worth. By all means let it be called by his name!

Many of our great have won success in spite of oft repeated failures. Recall the old story of King Bruce and the spider.

Others have fought through venomous opposition to victory.

Think of "the miracle of the Marne." Anything more unexpected couldn't be imagined.

"Somebody has been praying," said Kitchener. A German-American called it "one of the decisive battles of world history."

Still others have lifted humanity to higher levels of justice, freedom and opportunity in spite of the dead weight of public indifference and the vested interests of selfish men. For example, Wilber-

The first money won in the 4-H competition at the International Jersey Show at Chicago, last year, was won by a daughter of North Jester's Gem.

This outstanding bull is a son of Brampton Jester Standard 2nd, Superior, Gold and Silver Medal sire, and his dam is Nappan Gem's Model - classified Very Good, who was bred by the Experimental Farm at Nappan - one of the greatest cows ever developed in the Maritime provinces. If her udder had been as good as the rest of her body, she would have scored a very high excellent.

Her sire was Gem's Nobly Born, a bull that sired a lot of outstanding animals, and was grand champion many years ago at the Maritime Winter Fair. Her dam was the beautiful imported cow-Lord's Model, a daughter of the outstanding sire Lord of the Isle, and on Jersey Island she was a member of his winning progeny over the Island. She has quite a few records

giving her a high long distance production.

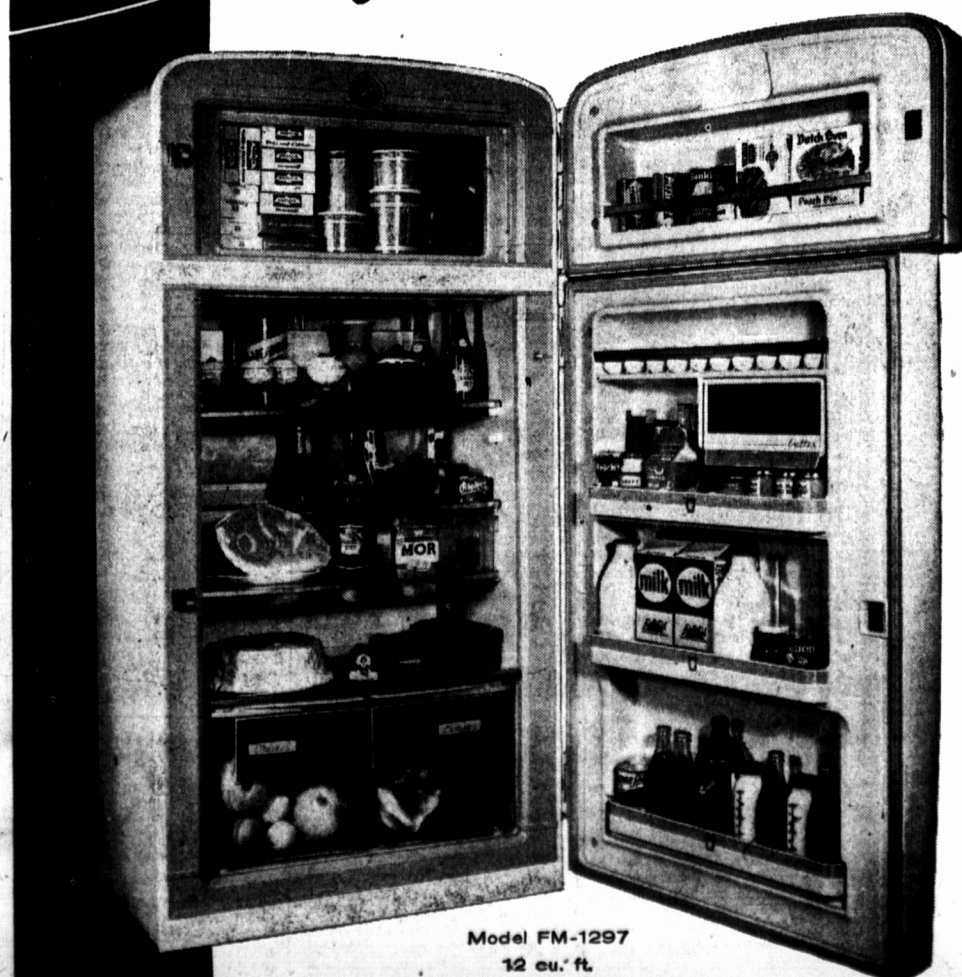
