

Naval Air Squadron Is Returning To S' side Base

Return of the naval air squadron to its home base at R. C. A. Station Summerside commenced Tuesday and will conclude today.

The squadron, VS80, under the command of Lieutenant Commander F. J. Townsend, left here in August and has been on board the "Maggie" since that time. It will remain in Summerside for an indefinite period.

The squadron's aircraft roared in the Summerside airbase on Tuesday and the remainder of the personnel will arrive by bus today.

The present strength of the squadron is approximately 150 all ranks.

Quite an interesting summer and fall was experienced by the squadron and all the operations at sea were carried out without incident.

When the squadron embarked on "The Maggie" off Halifax the ship proceeded to a rendezvous off Norfolk, Virginia, where it participated in NATO exercise new broom IV which took them to mid-Atlantic.

The ship and escorting destroyers then proceeded to the North Sea where they participated in another NATO exercise called Sea Enterprise.

At the conclusion of this exercise visits were made to a number of ports including Trondheim, Norway; Plymouth, England; Rotterdam, Holland; Gibraltar; Valencia, Spain; Genoa, Italy; and Marseilles, France. When the carrier returned to Halifax the aircraft flew off and came to Summerside.

Flying activity will commence next week and will be carried on regularly while the squadron is here. In addition to the Avengers the squadron has certain auxiliary aircraft including two helicopters.
