

National Hockey League Games Sat. End In Ties

Saturday was deadlock day in the National Hockey League with the only two scheduled games ending in identical 2-2 ties.

Chicago Black Hawks came from behind to squeeze out a point in their encounter with Canadiens at Montreal. And Detroit Red Wings did everything but rap in a winner in setting for a tie with Maple Leafs at Toronto.

Defenceman Elmer (Moose) Wilko whipped the tying goal at Montreal at 11:12 of the third period while Hawks were short-handed but the 2-2 score still left Canadiens six points ahead of the Wings in league standing.

Rookie Stan Mikita connected for the other Chicago goal late in the second period after Montreal had taken a 2-0 lead. Both Canadiens' goals—by Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion and defenceman Doug Harvey—came on long screen shots to finish off power plays while the Hawks were a man short.

Geoffrion's goal was his 10th of the season.

At Toronto, Leaf netminder Johnny Bower was amazing as he salvaged a single point for his team and kept Detroit from gaining on Montreal.

Toronto had taken a 2-1 margin in the first period but the Wings bounced back with the only goal of the second to close out the scoring. Detroit peppered Bower with 35 shots, but only two got by him.

Terry Sawchuk handled 24 but missed shots fired by left winger Johnny Wilson and Bert Olinstead.

Centre Norm Ullman had given Wings an early 1-0 lead and after Toronto pulled ahead it was left winger Alex Delvecchio who deadlocked the score at 12:12 of the second period.

"We Have To Play Better To Win," Says Bud Grant

WINNIPEG (CP) — Meditating over a plateful of steak, potatoes and vegetables, coach Bud Grant looked up and said: "We've got to play better than we have all season if we're going to win."

The Winnipeg coach was talking about Blue Bombers' best-of-three Western Interprovincial Football Union final against Edmonton Eskimos which opens at 5 p.m. AST Wednesday in Edmonton.

Grant, who had just put Bombers through a strenuous workout, showed concern about the forthcoming series as he sat in the dining room where the players still were tricking in for their nightly, after-practice meal.

"If we play as well as we did during the regular schedule, and Eskimos play as well as they did," Grant said, "then they'll beat us."

"They've got to play worse, or we've got to play better."

MENTION VAN PELT
Grant switched the conversation to the injury that sidelined first-string quarterback Jim Van Pelt. "Everybody is minimizing Van Pelt's loss. Many fans think Kenny (Kenny Ploen, second-string quarterback) is as good as Jimmy (Jimmy Gray, third-string quarterback) that Winnipeg suffered no loss when Jim was hurt last year."

"I disagree all around. Kenny is not as good as Van Pelt. Bombers were hurt both offensively and defensively when Jim suffered that shoulder separation, and we are not stronger than last year."

Maritime Football Teams Wind Up Regular Play Sat.

Canadian football teams in the Maritimes wound up regular play Saturday. Nova Scotians are the only ones with playoff games in the pot.

Dalhousie University whipped Stadacona Sailors 19-9 on a wet field and before the smallest crowd of the season in the final Nova Scotia Football League scheduled game Saturday. The second-place Tigers are expected to repeat the performance in a sudden-death, semi-final game with the third-place Sailors here Wednesday.

The winner goes against St. Francis Xavier University next Saturday. The X-men, unbeaten this year and with a winning streak going back to 197, are heavy favorites to claim the 201 Atlantic bowl game with the Ontario Agricultural College, winner of the Ontario Intercollegiate Football Conference.

University of New Brunswick Red Bombers made it five straight this year as they wound up the Maritime Intercollegiate League with a 39-0 win over hapless Acadia University. In another intercollegiate contest Mount Allison Mounties nipped upstart St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown 7-0.

The games ended the season schedule and no playoffs are scheduled. But many a fan is disappointed because he won't see the powerhouses of UNB and St. FX meet.

Quarterback Ted Wickwire threw three touchdowns passes for Dalhousie to give the Tigers their win. Sailors scored early in the first quarter when Eldon Johnson kicked a 22-yard field goal.

Pete Corkum, Brewer Auld and Ed Thomas were Wickwire's targets for Dal six - pointers. Stad quarterback Ed MacLeod scored the Sailors' only touchdown late in the second quarter. A rain-drenched ball spoiled all conversion attempts.

Maritime Intercollegiate standings have the Bombers first, with a 5-0 record. St. Mary's University of Halifax, which finished second in the five-team loop, did not play Saturday.

Cleveland, Reds Notch Victories

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (AP)—Cleveland Barons ended Rochester Americans' 22-game unbeaten home streak in the American Hockey League Sunday night with a wild 8-7 overtime victory.

Fred Glover scored four goals to lead the assault. His biggest was the one that ended the action at 2:35 of the sudden-death extra period.

The Americans lost their first at home since Jan. 16.

Rochester raced to a 2-0 lead in the first three minutes on goals by Rudy Mizay and Dave Creighton. But the Barons evened it when Michel Labadie and Glover hit before the end of the session.

The Barons added four goals to two for Rochester in the second period to make it 6-4. But the Amerks rallied for the lead again less than two minutes from the end with Hank Ciesla scoring once and Bob Nevin twice.

The Barons pulled goalie Gil Boisvert from the nets with 35 seconds remaining, and it paid off when Aldo Guidolin tallied with 21 seconds left to send the game into overtime.

Reibel, who also set up two other tallies, drilled the two goals that gave the Reds a 2-0 first-period lead.

Bo Elik, Ray Ross, Dan Polliziani, Bob Beckett and Ken Yacel made the other Providence goals while Dick Gamble scored Buffalo's lone tally in the second period.

Mounties Blank SDU Varsity 7-0

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—St. Dunstan Saints almost pulled off the upset of the season here Saturday forcing Mount Allison University Mounties to the limit before bowing 7-0 in the final game of the season for both clubs.

The result of the contest left the losers in fourth place in the five team loop while the Mounties finished third behind the champion UNB Red Bombers and the runner-up Saint Mary's Santamarias.

For the first three quarters it was anybody's game but the incomparable Harry (The Horse) Haukacla climaxed a brilliant three year career with Mounties by blasting off tackle from the four yard line on the second play

of the final quarter to post the winning margin. He then booted the extra point to account for all the scoring.

A steady downpour made good ball handling almost impossible. The teams, covered with mud, were unrecognizable from the stands before the first quarter ended. Only the color of their helmets told them apart.

Working from the split, Saints gave Mounties plenty of trouble in the first half and outplayed them for much of the session. With fullback Jim Bentham carrying the mail the losers surprised their heavily favored hosts with a series of counters and reverses that left gaping holes in the Mounties defensive wall.

U.S. Wins Back Ryder Cup In Overpowering Fashion

PALM DESERT, Calif. (AP)—The United States won back the Ryder Cup from the British Saturday with a dramatic, overpowering performance by captain Sam Snead and his teammates in the closing singles matches.

The margin of victory was 8½ to 3½ giving the Americans victory for the 10th time in 13 meetings since 1927.

Although it remained for Masters' champion Art Wall Jr. to score the clinching point, with a resounding 7 and 6 triumph over Ireland's Christy O'Connor, Snead stole the show.

In the other game at Montreal, University of Toronto Blues washed the winless McGill Redmen 23-0 to tie UWO in points in league standing. But the defending champion Blues lost the title since Mustangs had a better scoring record in games against Toronto.

Both teams finished the season with 31 records. No deciding playoff was called. Queen's and four points, on victories over the Redmen during the season.

Mustangs now meet the University of British Columbia Thunderbirds next Saturday at Toronto for the first east-west intercollegiate playoff to decide a Canadian intercollegiate champion.

Queen's opened the scoring against UWO when Mike Pettit made a dazzling 94-yard run in the first quarter for a touchdown; Don McNay added another in the third quarter. Bill Ritchie ran over for the convert on the early TD.

Roger Stewart and Lionel Conacher Jr. scored two touchdowns each for UWO. Frank Cosentino, Roy Wood, Clark Samways and Bob Pearson counted the others. Bill Mitchell kicked seven converts to win the league scoring championship.

In Montreal, the playoff passing of quarterback Nick Sopinka carried Toronto their shutout victory. Sopinka hurried TD passes in each of the first three quarters, hitting Bob Dann on a 66-yard play in the first, end Doug Loughheed with a 28-yarder in the second and end Mike Muir with a two-yarder in the third.

Peter Potter converted all three and kicked two singles.

OTTAWA (CP) —The Ottawa Rough Riders juggernaut demolished Montreal Alouettes 43-0 Saturday before 19,000 delirious fans in the Big Four football sudden-death semi-final.

Ottawa coach Frank Clair used alternating current - Canadian quarterback Russ Jackson and import general Vito (Babe) Parrilli—to spark the big red machine to an assembly line production rate of two touchdowns a quarter in the last three periods.

Talk of a Grey Cup champion has never been so prevalent here since Riders last went to the Canadian final—in 1951 — and beat Regina.

"Good, solid football" accounted for the Montreal thrashing said Clair in the understatement of the season.

"DISGUSTING," WALKER
"Disgusting" was the summary of Montreal coach Douglas (Redhead) Walker, who may not be around next season.

Ottawa meets Hamilton Tiger-Cats here Saturday in the first game of a two-game, total-points eastern final. The second game will be played at Hamilton the following Saturday and the Grey Cup game at Toronto Nov. 28.

The six Ottawa touchdowns were scored on a dry, sunlit field by Dave Thelen on a one-yard plunge, George Brancato on a six yard end-zone catch from Parrilli, Parrilli himself on a three-yard sneak, Al Romlie on a 74-yard run off an interception, Milt Graham on a 60-yard pass-and-run play off a Jackson forward and Bobby Simpson on an 18-yard end-zone throw from Jackson.

There Is Little To Choose Between Eskies, Bombers

EDMONTON (CP) —There is little to choose between Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Edmonton Eskimos as they prepare for the Western Interprovincial Football Union final.

So little that both clubs have been established as favorites in a roundabout way.

Bombers, 1958 Grey Cup champions and pennant-winners in the WIFU this season, are nine-to-two favorites to win the best-of-three series.

In game-to-game betting, Eskimos are favored. They are 3½-point choices to take the first game, which begins at 2 p.m. AST Wednesday in Edmonton.

If they win, they'll be certain favorites in the second game, and even if they lose that contest, the experts say Eskies may be betting favorites in the third game.

Edmonton's strong showing in the semifinals against British Columbia Lions and a good record against Winnipeg during the 16-game schedule are factors that have affected the odds.

The better apparently haven't overlooked Winnipeg's consistently powerful play during the season.

Winnipeg defeated Edmonton twice during regular play and Eskimos downed the Bombers twice with each club losing a home game to the other.

The Eskies outscored Bombers 55-50 in the four games, but relied mainly on a tough defence to bottle the Winnipeg attack.

Bruians Top Hawks 5-3; Rangers Tie Red Wings

BOSTON (AP) —Bronco Horvath enabled Boston to defeat Chicago Black Hawks 5-3 Sunday night by adding two goals to his National Hockey - leading total. The Bruins centre now has scored 15 goals in 14 games.

A wild third period was marred by a head injury to Boston's Charlie Burns and a penalty shot controversy. Burns has a silver plate in his head because of a previous hockey injury and wears a helmet while playing.

Burns was stretched in a pool of blood after colliding with Black Hawk defence man Pierre Pilon. He suffered a minor concussion and had to be assisted from the ice but later reports indicated he was in no danger.

Chicago, which now has gone 12 games without a victory, was given the choice of picking the Boston player to take a penalty shot.

Larry Leach was selected and Chicago goalie Glenn Hall turned back his try.

The opportunity resulted when defence man Al Arbour threw his stick trying to halt Horvath on a breakaway.

The penalty shot was the first since Oct. 17, 1954, in a Toronto - Bruins game which ended in a 1-1 tie.

Goalie Harry Lumley, then

with the Maple Leafs stopped Boston's Joe Klukay.

Lumley contributed 33 saves in helping Boston to its fourth straight triumph.

Horvath tallied at 9:06 of the first period on a pass from Johnnie Bucyk. He scored again at 14:20 of the middle period, tipping in a Vic Stasiuk shot.

Larry Leach, Fern Mackell and Stasiuk also scored for Boston while Phil Maloney, Bobby Hull and Ted Sloan scored for the losers.

DETROIT (AP) —Andy Bathgate scored with less than three minutes left Sunday night, snapping a New York Rangers losing streak at three games and producing a 3-3 tie with Detroit Red Wings in a National Hockey League game before 10,633 persons.

Bathgate scored from a scramble in front of the Detroit net seven minutes after the Red Wings had taken a 2-2 lead on Norm Ullman's unassisted tally.

The Rangers, with one victory in their last nine games, were forced to fight from behind twice in the final period.

Jim Bartlett scored only 73 seconds before Ullman's tally while the Rangers were a man short because of a penalty. Bartlett and Larry Popenin broke away together while the Red Wings were trapped up-ice trying to increase a 2-1 advantage.

Bill Gadsby sent New York ahead early in the first period. The defenceman stole a pass from Marcel Pronovost and fired a 30-footer into the Detroit net.

The Wings retaliated 3½ minutes later when defenceman Warren Godfrey tallied on a 30-footer. John McKenzie sent the Wings ahead 2-1 early in the second period with his first goal of the season. He scored after the faceoff, fed him a pass from the ice.

Rides Make Big 4 Finals; Whitewash Montreal 43-0

OTTAWA (CP) —The Ottawa Rough Riders juggernaut demolished Montreal Alouettes 43-0 Saturday before 19,000 delirious fans in the Big Four football sudden-death semi-final.

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Lynn's 27-yard punt run back to the Montreal eight in the first quarter, Clair sent in Parrilli.

In the second quarter, Parrilli connected with Simpson for 28 yards to the Montreal 10 on a pass off a double reverse and Thelen needed just the two line smashes to go over.

Etcheverry went to the air in earnest in the third quarter with disastrous results.

Trying to pass, he was rushed off his feet by the Ottawa chargers and dropped the ball. Lou Bruce recovered on the Montreal 13 and Ottawa scored in two plays, 1-10 yard thrust by Thelen and a fake handoff by Parrilli.

Later in the same quarter, Etcheverry completed three passes for 33 yards but then "nine picked off his sideline throw and ran 74 yards unmoisted for a touchdown."

JACKSON IN
Parrilli seemed to slow up and Clair sent in his alternate lightning bolt, Jackson. Early in the final quarter, Riders dropped their left end for one play, making tackle Milt Graham an eligible pass receiver. Graham gathered in Jackson's downcourt bullet and sprinted 40 yards for a touchdown. It was his first this year. He scored one last year on a recovered fumble.

Less than two minutes later, Lynn intercepted on Etcheverry and ran 25 yards to the Montreal

13. Jackson successfully used the pass off the double reverse for the second time in the game, firing to Simpson in the end zone.

That completed the carnage and only a brave goal-line stand by Montreal in the final minutes prevented another touchdown. Lynn took three vain smashes from the one-yard line after he had broken straight over centre for 56 yards.

NEARLY SCORED
Alouettes alarmed Ottawa only once. That was in the first quarter when Veyl Switzer ran 56 yards to the Ottawa 26 after taking a screen pass. Montreal had to settle for a field goal attempt, however, and it was short. Montreal had two other mid chances in the last period but then a score couldn't have mattered less.

Ottawa made 19 first downs to Montreal's 13 and rushed for 296 yards to Al's 24. Montreal picked up only one first down rushing. Etcheverry outpassed Parrilli and Jackson 277 yards to 171. He completed 17 of 36 passes, Parrilli four of eight and Jackson three of nine.

Thelen, the league's record-holding ground gainer, carried 96 yards in 19 attempts. Simpson caught four passes for 69 yards and Switzer three for the same yardage.

Haney stepped back into baseball to manage the Hollywood Stars from 1949 through 1952 and then returned to the major leagues.
