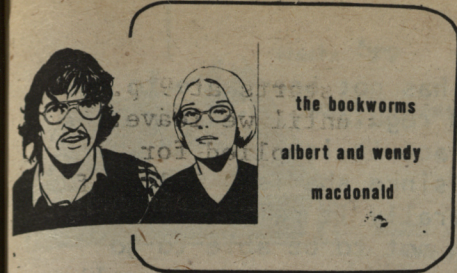


From Russia With Love



"The Russians" by Hedrick Smith

This is a purely descriptive work by a newspaper correspondent living in Russia.

Well written by a perceptive man it describes Russia as it is, not as it should be, or not as it is often described. The book deals mainly with the people, their habits, activities, and their nature. It deals with the incredible Russian Bureaucracy with its labyrinth of intricacies and the methods that Russians use to deal with them. It deals with the surpluses and shortages of their economy and how it affects daily life. A second hand

car costs twice as much as a new one. (It takes two years to order a new one, and several years to get it.) There are only two service stations in Moscow.

Smith sees the people of Russia as being slightly paranoid but attributes this to the political system. Smith also stays away from the emotionalism which has characterized the American viewpoint of Russia. He doesn't see Commies lurking in every corner. Rather he takes and manages to keep a rather objective stand on what he sees.

One of the more interesting chapters in the book deals with the status of the Russian woman quoting statistics that have been used to show the Russian woman as liberated, e.g., 75% of all doctors are women, Smith claims that Russian women still do all the work at home, so one

wonders especially with 85% of all women now in the labour force.

Smith challenges the myth that class lines are a thing of the past. Pointing out villas, the ownership of expensive foreign cars and special stores he says that class distinctions are just as defined in Russia as here.

Smith also looks at the school system which on the one hand is authoritarian and repressive but on the other hand produces some quality students. Smith also noticed a marked change in the viewpoint, however, in the several years he was there.

To sum up this book I found it to be slightly superficial, as it is almost totally descriptive. However, it is detailed and accurate.

The real test for this book came when I gave it to my wife's grandmother

who is Russian. She rather liked the book, saying she thought it was very accurate.

As a result I have no qualms in recommending this to any reader be it the curious or a student of Russian life.

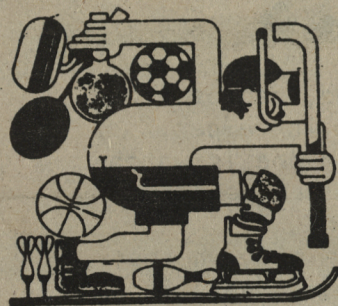

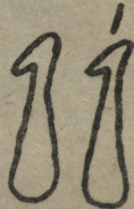
