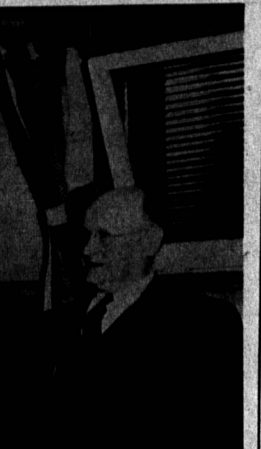

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Centennial Birthday Cake To Be Unveiled On Monday

The largest birthday cake Charlottetown has ever seen will be unveiled on Monday evening, June 6, on the Provincial Building Square, marking the official opening of the Centennial Celebrations.

Placed between the Provincial Building and the Soldiers' Monument, the cake will be lit by Mr. Leo F. Golden of Hartford, Conn., representing the President of Rotary International which will be celebrating its 50th anniversary in this city next week.

The evening will start at approximately eight o'clock with a concert by the Recce Band playing from the north side of the Provincial Building. Mayor J. D. Stewart and City Clerk J. A. Fullerton, accompanied by Mr. Golden and his Aide, will then head a parade of Rotarians to the square, where they will meet with the parties of Lt.-Gov. T. W. L. Prowse and Premier A. W. Matheson.

These official parties, escorted by men of the R.C.M.P. and City Police Force, will then proceed to the balcony from which the chairman, Lt.-Col. Frank Storey will open the ceremony. After a few remarks, Mayor Stewart will present a key of the City to Mr. Golden, and ask him to unveil and light the cake in celebration of Charlottetown's one hundred years of progress.

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Not Concerned About Floods

REGINA (CP)—Saskatchewan Municipal Affairs Minister L. P. McIntosh says the provincial government is not too concerned about the 1955 agricultural picture. Addressing the Urban Municipalities Association convention on Thursday night, he said there is still time for the province's economy to recover from the spring floods.

"In 1954, some 17 rural municipalities suffered excess moisture and the acreage seeded fell below expectation," he said. "This year approximately one-third of the province has suffered from flooding. In the eastern section, 4,500,000 acres were under water May 20, and nearly 9,000 acres of crops were affected. Damage to roads, bridges and a culvert totalled about \$4,750,000 and property damage has been reported from 11 municipalities."

Peron Faces Excommunication

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Argentina's president Juan D. Peron, a Roman Catholic once decorated by the Pope, is only a step from excommunication if not already punished by the church, a Vatican authority said Friday.

"We cannot say yet whether he has fallen into the state of excommunication, nor can we deny it," a monsignor consultant of the Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office said in comment on a Church-state feud in Argentina.

"But certainly he is in grave sin, and with him all the legislators (of the Peronista-dominated congress) who have adopted the law on divorce, eliminated religious education from the schools and concurred in the arrests of priests and catholic laymen."

"What is certain, if the president has not fallen into the state of excommunication, is that he is a very short step from it."

Excommunication varies in degree. In minor cases it means suspension of the sacraments. Major excommunication calls for absolute expulsion from the church and all its rights and advantages, in the case of great offenders even from social intercourse with other Catholics. Sometimes it may be incurred automatically. At other times the church proclaims it, usually through decree of the Holy Office, which the Pope heads.
