HOME FOR INTERMENT.—The Summerside Pioneer says: The body of Mr. John McDonald, accompanied by a daughter of the deceased, was brought across in the St. Lawrence on Thursday evening, and taken on to Valleyfield for interment. The deceased was 60 years of age, and was accidentally killed on the railroad at Quincy, Mass., on the 13th inst., upon which he was travelling as a passenger.

KING'S COLLEGE.—We had a call to-day from Rev H How, of Windsor, N S, who is collecting for King's College, which has lately celebrated its centenary, in honor of which event the Board of Governors wish to endow a professorship. Mr How is now appealing to the Maritime Provinces for \$25,000. He has so far visited Summerside, Port Hill and Alberton, and thanks to the co-operation of the clergy, has been very successful. The rev. gentleman preached in St Paul's and St Peter's churches yesterday, and is canvassing the city to-day. He goes to Kensington for Wednesday evening.

NEW CHURCH.—The Yarmouth Herald says: The new Roman Catholic Church here is an exceptionally fine and substantial representative of church architecture. Located in a commanding situation, with ample space around it, its fine proportions are shown to great advantage. The grounds are extensive and nicely graded. The building is of pure Romanesque design, built of pressed brick, with stone foundation and trimmings. There are two round towers on the northern end of the church—one on each corner—one surmounted with a cross. We understand that the design was suggested by His Grace Archbishop O'Brien, on his return from Rome, and is a reduced copy of one of the noblest churches in the imperial city. The church will be consecrated on the 1st Sunday in October. His Grace the Archbishop will officiate, and he will in all probability be accompanied by Bishop Macdonald, of P E Island. The Church altogether will cost \$20,000.

LEAVING ST. MARGARET'S FOR SUMMERSIDE.—Among the various changes that are being made in the location of our Island clergy, we notice that the name of the Rev. D. J. G. McDonald, of St. Margaret's parish, is on the list. Father "Margaret," as he is familiarly called, has resided at St. Margaret's for a number of years. Though a young man, he has done a goodly share of missionary work, and, besides, ranks among the ablest preachers in the diocese. He is an industrious student, possessing fine literary taste both as a speaker and writer. As a lecturer, he is also favorably known. Some of his lectures, such as "The Church in Council," "General McMahon," and "Daniel O'Connell and His Times," show more than ordinary literary merit. His present parishioners part with him with the deepest regret. He goes to Summerside parish early in October.
