

Judge C. G. Duffy Died In City Hospital Yesterday

C. Gavan Duffy, retired County Court Judge, passed away at the Charlottetown Hospital at 4 o'clock yesterday morning. He was eighty-three years old.

The late Judge Duffy was born in Kinkora, November 2, 1874, the son of the late James M. and Elizabeth (Smith) Duffy. His early education was received at the Thistle and Shamrock School, Middleton. From there, he went to Prince of Wales College, and after receiving his first class teacher's license taught school at Tracadie and Tignish before entering St. Dunstan's College.

The late Judge Duffy was one of the foremost lawyers of his day in this Province and a speaker of more than usual ability. From his youth he took an active interest in politics and remained throughout life a staunch supporter of the Liberal party.

He maintained an interest in provincial, national, and international affairs until almost the very end of a long and active career. He had been in good health until about three weeks ago when he was suddenly taken ill and removed to hospital. For a time, it was thought he might recover for he did rally and appeared to be back on the road toward restored health but yesterday evening took a turn for the worse.

Politics Arouses Interest; Students Try Their Hand

Two weeks have come and gone since we last wrote a report on The Week at S.D.U. One of those weeks was relatively inactive, the mid-term examinations but they have since past and their like will not stimulate the latent energies of the student body until the finals are upon us and the College year of 1957-58 will then be little better than a memory. For some it will be a pleasant memory and, undoubtedly for others, not so pleasant a memory.

The interest in politics at Saint Dunstan's has been with us longer than two weeks. Perhaps it started in earnest when the College sent a delegation to the Maritime University Parliament held at St. Francis Xavier University early in February. No matter what it started it is now the principle topic of conversation of our campus.

MODEL PARLIAMENT
The recent visit to Charlottetown of Prime Minister Diefenbaker and the Leader of the Opposition Mr. Pearson, has certainly stirred the imagination of many of the Saints and the culmination of this interest will be reached on the afternoon of March 19 when the president of the St. Dunstan's Alumni Association Judge J.S. DesRoche, will open the College's first Model Parliament.

The Government will be Progressive Conservative under the leadership of Don MacDougall. The P.C.s will form a minority government having 33 members out of the 71 member Parliament. The official opposition will be the Liberal Party under the guidance of Faber MacDonald, a member of the Junior class. The Liberals have 22 supporters and the National Reform group headed by Charlie Campbell have 12. Brian Noonan and Louis Ready heading the C.C.F., and Independents respectively round out the 71 member parliament. The speaker will be Judge C. St. Clair Trainor who will preside over the parliament's three sessions.

PHILOSOPHERS' DAY
Friday, March 7 was the day set aside by St. Dunstan's, as it is every year, to honour St. Thomas Aquinas. "Philosopher's Day" was highlighted by a banquet held at the Charlottetown Hotel for all those students enrolled in any of the Philosophy courses at St. Dunstan's. The guest speaker for the banquet was Lt. Col. L.F. MacDonald, Principal of Queen Square School. He spoke on the teaching profession and offered the suggestion that some of those present might enter the field of education.

BASKETBALL
Over the weekend First Team played two exhibition games in Basketball, one against a group from Minto and a second against the Moncton Movers. Both matches were victories for the Red and White St. Dunstan's quintet. In the first game, held on Saturday evening in the College gym, the Saints defeated Minto 66-49. Captain Lorne MacGuigan paced his team with twenty five points followed by Gerry Tingley who accounted for fourteen. Sunday's encounter against Moncton gave them more trouble than did the game of the previous evening. At the half way mark the Saints were three points up on their opponents and in the closely contested and fiery final half they were out-scored by one point by the opposition. The final tally gave the St. Dunstan's squad 49 points to the 47 of the Movers. MacGuigan and Tingley again led the Saints in the scoring department accounting for 17 and 14 points respectively.

The other guests present were: His Excellency Most Rev. Bishop MacEachern, Very Rev. John Sullivan, Rector at St. Dunstan's; Miss Francis MacMillan, the University's librarian; Rev. Thomas MacLellan and Rev. Lawrence Landrigan, both of whom teach Philosophy at St. Dunstan's.

HOCKEY
The traditional junior vs. senior hockey match was held in the College rink during the morning and for a few brief minutes during the encounter the spark of rivalry that was struck last fall almost burst into a flame. The spirit of the day prevailed though and when the zany play had finished both teams left the ice in the best of spirits, the seniors were perhaps a little more exuberant than the juniors as they left the conquerors.

RED AND WHITE
The College magazine, The Red and White, published thrice yearly has gone to press and barring any further delays at the publishers should be ready for distribution within the next week or so. Preparations for the final issue and the gathering of photographs and other material for it will be underway in all probability before the Winter edition is circulated. The final publication takes on the appearance of a year book, although it is not so called. It covers all college activities for the past year both pictorially and verbally yet it still

maintains its status as a literary magazine. This week at S.D.U. will be closed out by a Retreat starting on Thursday evening. The three days devoted to the Retreat will afford the majority of the students a chance for a good qualitative self analysis and purification process. If the students take advantage of this retreat, and undoubtedly they will, the beginning of next week will find better men in many ways than did the end of this week.

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protection enjoyed by N. S. farmers in respect to enclosed ponds, and impose a penalty of \$25 on hunters letting farm gates stand open or driving cars over farmers fields without first obtaining permission.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS
Other resolutions receiving approval at the Dairymen's final business session Thursday afternoon recommended the establishment of employee retirement plans for all provincial dairies; endorsed the collection of Federation dues by dairy plants; approved the collection of the June "set-aside" by lowering by one cent per pound the price of butterfat to the producer; asked that the basic price of 34 cents per pound for Canada First Grade Cheese, as established in Ontario

to in 1957, be maintained in 1958. In addition Island Dairymen approved by resolution support for the Dairy Farmers of Canada in their efforts to obtain a 64-cent floor price for butter, and the proposal of insuring farm workers under the Unemployment Insurance scheme, provided the Commission can come up with some plan acceptable to the farm population.

The Island Dairymen also endorsed the establishment of a three-month test period during which milk plant tests will be carried out during the same period, and asked all Dairying Companies to revise their membership lists, attend meetings, and promote a renewed interest in the Federation.
