The president reported that the dictionaries and other text books for the school had been ordered. Present at this meeting were some of the entrance pupils of last year from the town school, as the Governor General's Medal and the prizes for the pupils who led in the various entrance subjects were being presented at this meeting. The principal, Mr. James MacDonald, presented the medals and prizes. The Home and School Association on behalf of both schools expressed their gratitude to all those who donated prizes at the end of the school year. A discussion followed on ways of increasing funds.
