Weed Killers

To prevent grass or weeds growing in driveways, gardeners are advised to spray with some of the commercial weed killers now available. If not handy gasoline will do the trick. Care must be exercised to keep these killers away from wanted grass, flowers or shrubbery.

Pests

Garden insect enemies are divided into two groups—those that eat holes in the foliage and those that suck out the juices. For the first-named, poison is usually applied while the suckers are attacked with a burning spray which penetrates. Often when both are present, a combination of poison and something that burns, such as lime sulphur and arsenate, gives the best results.

Where the King and Queen had a Home of Their Own



When Their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth, spent a brief rest period at Jasper Park Lodge on their journey eastward through the Rockies, they had a little home all their own. Except for two personal servants, they lived alone in Outlook Cottage, a beautifully appointed log cabin on the shore of Lac Beauvert and they expressed great pleasure at the opportunity to enjoy complete rest, free from formality. The photograph shows them on the lawn in front of their cabin. Looking across the lake, they could see the white peak of Mount Edith Cavell. They afterwards visited it by motor car and alighted on the ice of its glacier. A message of appreciation was sent to S. J. Hingsford, Chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways by Their Majesties from the Royal Train after their departure from Jasper. The message, signed by Alan F. Laucelles, acting Private Secretary, read: "The King and Queen left Jasper this morning with great regret and much appreciation all that was done for their comfort and amusement during their enjoyable stay there."

WASTE PRODUCTS YIELD CRUDE OIL BOLSOVER, England, June 14—(CP)—Britain, dependent for almost all its oil supplies on overseas sources, has seen the opening of its first plant for producing crude oil from waste products of coal distillation. The plant in this Derbyshire town, has a capacity of 10,000,000 gallons a year. The whole potential output already has been ordered by industrial firms and it is expected another unit will be added to the plant as soon as possible.

Railways of Ireland have laid off many hands recently because of falling business, and the unemployment and railway problems of the country threaten to become serious. By order of the War Office, the use of puttees for parades has been discarded by the Royal Engineers of Chatham Garrison, and the practice may become general in the Army.
