Montague Prepares For February Election

MONTAGUE — The last regular meeting of the present town council was held last night. Nomination day for the new date is Jan. 22 with election day, Feb. 5. If an election is necessary.

If all councillors re-elector or if just the right amount of citizens offer no election will be necessary, however, Councillors Hughes, Greene and Reid were the only ones to indicate they would re-elect last night.

Councillors Ings and Beck are undecided with C. J. Fraser advising he will not offer for another term. Mayor Bruce Yeo indicated he intends to offer for another term.

Mayor Yeo thanked the council for its co-operation and support during the term and stated that "although we did not always agree, we discussed matters, came to an agreement and if we all agreed at a time, we would not need a council."

The town clerk outlined briefly the tax situation for the past year, adding that the revenue was approximately the same as in 1961. The tax arrears are in the hands of the lawyer and it is expected that further action will be taken by the new council to bring these up to date.

Souris W. Man Given Two-Year Prison Term

GEORGETOWN — Joseph Henry Daniel Phillip Steele, 36, of Souris West, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary on each of three charges by Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

The three sentences will run concurrently. Steele, elected trial by magistrate, pleaded guilty to all charges against him. He was charged with breaking, entering and theft at the dwelling house of Isadore Martin in Souris West and the same charge was laid against him at the dwelling house of Frank MacDonald of Georgetown Royalty. Steele's record showed two previous charges of breaking and entering and theft and also for two escapes from jail custody.

Denay Attorney-General J. Arthur McGeigan represented the Crown in all cases.

James Francis Langhaue, Souris Line Road, pleaded guilty to possession of unlawfully manufactured liquor under the Excise Act and was fined \$100 and costs or three months.

The management has had a tough time to get enough ice to warrant the opening of the rink. A limited amount of skating had been made available to school and pre-school children in late December but due to the mild weather no activity was possible until this week.

It is expected that the two top rivals the Primroses and Murray Harbor will take to the ice at Montague Saturday night.

This year the Community Welfare League Limited is operating the rink but as one of the members stated it is getting necessary each year to have an artificial ice plant.

Hal Banks Classes Jodoin As Red 'Fellow Traveller'

OTTAWA (CP)—Hal C. Banks of the Seafarers' International Union said Wednesday he would class president Claude Jodoin of the Canadian Labor Congress as a Communist "fellow traveler."

The charge—unsupported by evidence—was made by the 44-year-old union boss as he faced questioning about SIU allegations of Communist infiltration of the CLC-affiliated Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers.

Mr. Banks claimed that top officers of the Canadian Brotherhood put Communists to work on the west coast and the Great Lakes.

"I know quite a bit about Communies," said the waterfront union chief. "I've been fighting them for a long time—successfully."

Mr. Justice T. G. Norris, before whom the SIU leader is appearing as a witness, said the SIU used to shout its anti-Communist war cry back in 1949 when it was fighting the Communist Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers.
