## Ex-British Tennis Player Will Aid Youth Program

 LONDON (CP)—Tony Mottram was always on the fringes in the world class tennis set. But for nearly 10 years he was all Britain had.

The 35-year-old wartime Royal Air Force flier, who with his wife has turned professional, set a record that way.

Between his first Davis Cup appearance in 1947 against Poland and his 1955 swan song against India, he carried the British flag in 19 Davis Cup draws—sometimes in doubles as well as singles.

Mottram's peak was passed a couple of years ago in a career highlighted by two major events. Once he got as far as the Wimbledon doubles finals and in 1951 he pulled a Wimbledon sensation by ousting Jaroslav Drobny, the exiled Czech who finally went all the way in the Wimbledon singles in 1954.

## Noted Audubon Society Lecturer To Speak Here

Dick Bird of Regina, Saskatchewan (right) noted motion picture producer, writer and National Audubon Society speaker will lecture and show films at a public meeting to be held in the Queen Charlotte High School on Tuesday, November 15 at 8 p.m.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Queen County Fish and Game Association. A very interesting color film on Newfoundland will be shown the audience by the noted speaker.

Mr. Bird has been in the motion picture production business since 1908. Early in his career he was a news photographer, covering the First World War, Mexican Revolution, Spanish Revolution as well as famines in India and China.

In recent years he has done film assignments for Walt Disney's outdoor adventure series and has made motion pictures for the Canadian Government on wildlife in the National Parks.

For several years he conducted his own radio program called "Camera Trails" devoted to conservation of wildlife and other natural resources. His writings on nature and photography have been published in magazines in the United States and Britain.

In recent years he has devoted considerable time to extensive lecture tours.

His film on Newfoundland shows Canada's newest province to be a land of peace, beauty and rich natural resources. It features a rugged and smiling land of quaint charm and rich abundance.

## Opened Doors In 1908 Closing Of Dufferin Track Ends Era In Can. Racing

 TORONTO (CP)—The gates of Toronto's Dufferin race track swung shut Monday on an era in Canadian racing.

The closing of Dufferin, after 47 years of commercial racing, marks the disappearance, for the time being, at least, of the Orpen family from the racing scene.

From a small start in 1908, the late Abram (Abe) M. Orpen became the acknowledged dean of racing in Canada. His son Fred operated tracks at Dufferin and suburban Long Branch until their recent sale to a group headed by E. P. Taylor, Toronto sportsman and industrialist.

**1000-1 PAYOFF**

Capitalized at \$4,000, Dufferin and its sister track were sold this year for a reported \$4,000,000. The 21 acres in the centre of a residential district of the west end will become a shopping centre.

Dufferin, in many ways unique among Canadian tracks, had a clientele all its own who considered it "their" track. Lunch pails and working clothes were a common sight on any racing days at "Little Saratoga."

A track that admitted patrons from after the first few races, fans casually dropped into Dufferin, placed a bet or two, and went on their way.

Dufferin never had a clubhouse and never charged admission to the paddock. There was no small reserved section in the wooden grandstands.

**"OUTLAW" TRACK**

During its early years, and son said, Dufferin was considered an "outlaw" track by other racing operators.

The prohibition against racing at other tracks built up a strong esprit de corps among owners, jockeys and patrons which lasted up to the present day.

At the final meet owner Fred Orpen for the last time performed his daily ritual of playing the National Anthem on an organ—the public address system.

## Argonaut Cast Off 1955 Big Four Scoring Champ

TORONTO (CP)—End Al Pfeifer, a Toronto Argonaut castoff who caught on when club officials changed their minds, is the 1955 Big Four scoring champion with 98 points.

The big import from Fordham University, a threat throughout most of the 12-game season, came up with a nine-point last-game performance to take the honors over Montreal's Pat Abbruzzi, the man who runs like a tank.

Abbruzzi was held off the scoresheet as the Als bowed 28-6 to Tiger-Cats at Hamilton last Saturday and finished his first year of Canadian football with 95 points.

**TD RECORD**

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press show Pfeifer with 15 touchdowns and 23 converts against Abbruzzi's Canadian record of 19 touchdowns over the 12 games.

Bud Korchak and Joey Pal of Montreal and Ottawa's Bobby Simpson ended in a third-place tie, each with 60 points.

Pfeifer's championship-winning total was 10 points off the record set by Edgar (Special Delivery) Jones in 1950.

Johnny Bennett of McGill Redmen was blanked in Saturday's game against Queen's Golden Gaels but he managed to finish the six-game Senior Intercollegiate schedule at the top of the list with 31 points. Just one more than Gaels' Ron Stewart, who picked up 10 points on a touchdown and five converts to finish the schedule in third place with 29 points.

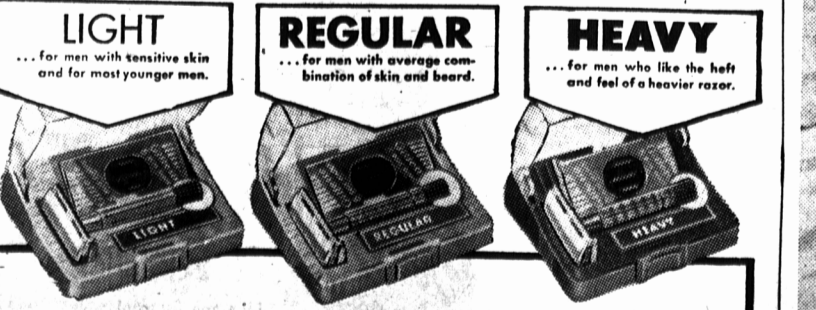
