THE OSBORNE.—This well-known and popular hotel has passed into the hands of Mr. P. P. Archibald, late of the Albion House, Halifax, by whom it will be conducted in future. Last evening, the retiring proprietress, Mrs. C. V. McGregor, was presented with an address signed by the guests of the house. The Address spoke in terms of praise of the manner in which the hotel was conducted in the past, and the hope was expressed that the new proprietor would be equally fortunate in obtaining the good wishes and respect of the patrons of the house.

DARING BURGLARY.—On Saturday or Sunday night last some person effected an entrance into the store of Mr. R. K. Jost, north side of Queen Square, and stole therefrom about \$25 in cash and a quantity of the best men's boots in the shop. The boots were taken from their boxes on the shelves, and the money was taken from the cash box in the safe. On Monday morning Mr. Jost instituted a search, and found fifteen pairs of boots scattered in the attic of the building in which the store is located. Some five or six weeks ago the same store was entered and \$15 stolen from the cash drawer. It is thought that the thief, who must be well acquainted with the premises, entered through a window on the second floor, to reach which he would have to climb over a perch in the rear of the building. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 7.

Sir John Macdonald this afternoon in answer to an inquiry said that Monday next would be set aside for the discussion of the reports of the Rykert and Middleton Committees.

The Banking Bill was again considered in Committee. Several trifling amendments mainly explanatory were made, and one new clause was added respecting the not circulation of the Bank of British North America and the Banque Du Peuple. These charters do not impose on the shareholders of these banks double liability for the notes, and as they thus offer less security than the other banks. Hon. Mr. Foster proposed that their authorized note issue should not be to the full amount of their paid-up capital, as is the case with the others, but only to the extent of 75 per cent of their capital, and that for any further issue desired they should deposit cash or bonds as security for the same.

After recess, the bill was reported from the committee. Hon. Mr. Foster moved the third reading of the tariff bill, and Sir Richard Cartwright thereupon moved in amendment, declaring that in view of the excess of revenue over expenditure reported and estimated in the budget, it was inexpedient to continue to tax the necessities of life.

Hon. Mr. Foster, in reply, showed that the tariff did not bear heavily upon necessities.

After further discussion, Cartwright's amendment was lost on a party division of 62 to 93, and the bill was then read a third time and passed.

The House spent some time in supply, and adjourned at 1.50.

The Corner Stone Laid.

HALIFAX, May 7.

The corner stone of St. Mary's Young Men's L. A. & B. Society's new hall on Barrington Street, was laid this morning. The Society in full regalia assembled at their Rooms and marched to the site of their new building headed by the 66th Band. His Grace the Archbishop performed the ceremony.

Want Free Ammunition.

OTTAWA, May 7.

A deputation of military men waited upon the Government to-night, requesting that the ammunition for the use of the Military Rifle League be furnished free of charge to those participating in the matches. Sir Adolph Caron said that the request would receive the Government's immediate attention.

The Strike Ended.

NEW YORK, May 7.

The strike of organized carpenters in this city for eight hours work and \$3.50 wages a day, practically ended this morning by the announcement that the only two prominent employers who had not acceded to the demand of the men, would sign the contract.

The Longue Point Holocaust.

MONTREAL, May 7.

Things look dismal enough at Longue Point to-day, where a few crumbling walls are all that remain of the once magnificent Asylum of St. Jean de Dieu. Dr. Duquette, who was on the grounds from the start, places the death list at 60, at least. He likewise believes that it will be found that a few more perished in the flames.

Customs Peculations.

BUENOS AYRES, May 7.

Grave peculations have been discovered in the customs department here, and the revenue lost by the Government by embezzlement is estimated to have reached \$10,000,000 annually.

Prorogation of Parliament.

OTTAWA, May 7.

It is now thought to be an impossibility for prorogation to take place on Wednesday next, and it is expected that a week from next Saturday will more likely be the day that the House will close.

The Combines Bill Thrown Out.

OTTAWA, May 7.

After a discussion taking up all this forenoon and evening, the Senate by a vote of 27 to 14 threw out Clarke Wallace's combines bill.

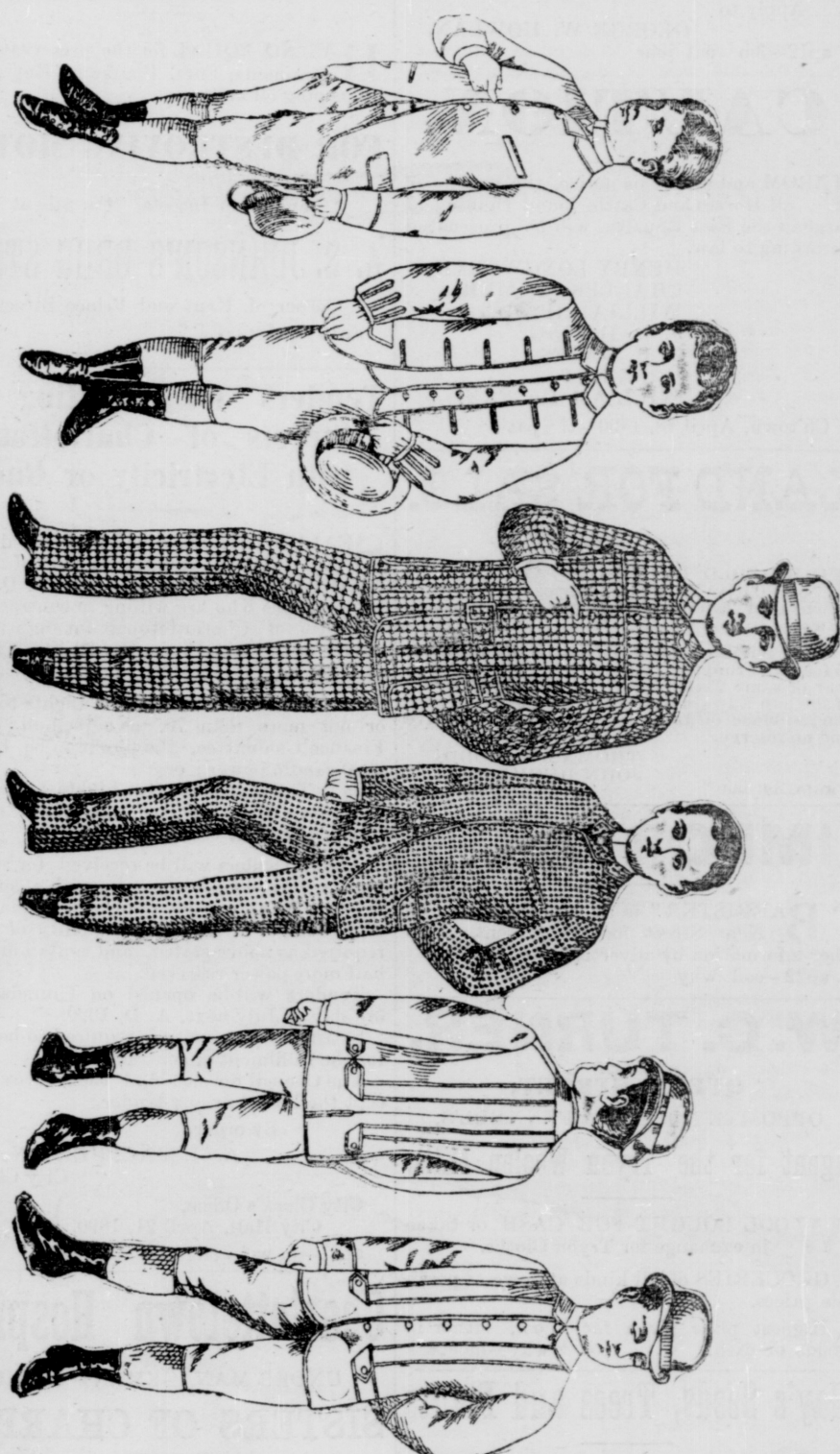
