Caleb is one of 12 men to reconnoiter the Promised Land. Upon their return, ten of the spies' reports were so gloomy the people despaired.—Numbers 13:1-29.

Trusting wholly in God's promise that the land of Canaan should be theirs, Caleb urges immediate invasion. Joshua seconds him, but they were rejected and stoned.—Numbers 13:30-14:10.

For their disbelief, God decrees Israel shall wander another 40 years before gaining the Promised Land. Only Joshua and Caleb will remain alive to see it.—Numbers 14:11-38.

With Canaan theirs, Caleb picks the Anahim's mountain hideout as his land in order to destroy them.—Joshua 14:6-15.

**CALEB'S INSPIRING EXAMPLE**

**Rewards Of Unwavering Faith**

No normal man wants to fail in life, but success sometimes demands a high price, and some men, not willing to pay that price, forfeit success and find themselves in an ever-deepening morass of failure.

The life of Caleb, however, was a tremendous success because he started right to begin with and continued always to seek and follow the will of God. He was courageous, steadfast, an individual who refused to yield to difficulties and went through life doing hard things.

When he died, at an advanced age, it was in the fullness of strength, conquering the enemies of Israel, Caleb, who disciplined himself and pressed for moral as well as military victories, is an inspiring example to all who are seeking the better way of life.

We first meet this mighty man of faith in Numbers 13. Moses had been a divinely instructed that each of the tribes of Israel should choose a man of consequence among them to be sent as a spy into the land of Canaan.

Caleb, picked by the tribe of Judah, and Joshua, from the tribe of Ephraim, explored the land from the wilderness of Zin, in southern Palestine, to Rehob, in the extreme north. On their return, at the Valley of Eshcol, they cut off a branch with a cluster of grapes so large that it had to be suspended on a rod as both men were needed to carry it.

Returning, all 12 spies agreed that the land was indeed flowing with milk and honey, as rumors had indicated; that the cities there were fortified and occupied by an unusually strong race of people, the children of Anak. From this point on, though, the reports differed. Ten of the spies painted such a gloomy, forbidding picture that the people became frightened, wept, and talked of returning to Egypt.

Now Caleb stepped in. Seconded by Joshua, and trusting wholly in God and His promise that the Israelites would occupy the land of Canaan, Caleb recommended immediate invasion. He had a deep moral conviction about the land and he stated it, even though it meant taking a stand against ten "brethren" and turning in a minority report. For such a man as Caleb, to have done otherwise would have violated his principles and made him a moral coward. He had the courage of his conviction and the spirit of an overcomer.

As reward, Caleb and Joshua were stoned by the congregation.

Because of her refusal to believe God and enter into the Promised Land, God decreed punishment for all of Israel, save Caleb and Joshua. They were doomed to wander 40 years in the wilderness, until all the adults were dead. Then Caleb and Joshua would lead the children into the land of Canaan.

Though the land of Canaan had been promised the Hebrews

**Young Canadians Company Needs Aims, Methods Listed**

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Welfare Council said here the aims and methods of the Company of Young Canadians must be spelled out clearly before the new federal agency goes to work.

In a memo to the CYC organizing committee, the council said Prime Minister Pearson's description of the CYC is "very vague" and should be clarified in a national conference.

The memo said the company should concentrate on long-term community projects to help underprivileged youth. Volunteer "grass roots" workers should be recruited from the underprivileged class as well as from the "elite" of middle-class university students.

"Elite" volunteers in the U.S. Peace Corps and VISTA, its domestic counterpart, often suffered a "pangs of shock" when they came into contact with the completely different way of life and attitudes of the poor.

The council said underprivileged volunteers trained by professional social workers may be accepted better by the poor and prove more effective in helping them.

**NEW APPROACH URGED**

The company should stay away from individual case work and develop imaginative new approaches of assisting communities to break out of the poverty vicious circle.

"Goodwill, enthusiasm and loving kindness are not enough," said the memo, drafted by the council's executive director, Reuben Baetz.

"Professional skill, objectivity and an increasing effort to uncover and analyze facts are essential."

**British Firms Await Ruling From Ottawa**

MONTREAL (CP)—British exporters are waiting for decisions from the revenue department in Ottawa on more than 20 applications for recently announced exemptions from Canadian tariff law, a British government trade official said here.

Shawn Stewart, commercial councillor at the British high commission in Ottawa, told a luncheon meeting of the British Canadian Trade Association that he had hoped decisions would have been made by now on the basis of a government policy statement last spring and parliamentary action in June.

Another 60 to 70 similar applications are being prepared, Mr. Stewart said, "and it all goes well, a great many British firms large and small, should be able to take advantage of the concession to improve their position in the Canadian market against competition from third countries."

The change in the law was made to enable British exporters to offer goods in Canada at volume prices lower than they charge in their home market without incurring automatic imposition of anti-dumping duties in Canada.

**Skilful Critics Get Direct Hits**

The 'debunker' is riding high these days. Everywhere you turn verbal sharpshooters are telling us that Canada has nothing worth celebrating in 1967. Our government is inept, our schools inadequate, our churches worthless and our homes disolving, so they say. These critics are skilful and they score some direct hits. They also get a ready hearing. There's a sadistic streak in most of us, and we like to watch the other fellow squirm.

No one would deny the need to scrutinize our institutions and our ethics carefully. We must constantly reform and readjust, but it's time to ask where all this destructiveness is taking us. Much as we may chafe at their limitations, we live by and through these time-tested social groupings. Without them we are homeless and lost. The late Dr. Lothrop Stoddard of Harvard pointed this out clearly. "Civilizations is characterized," he wrote, "by political and social organizations composed of individuals capable of sustaining the elaborate complex and handing it on. It will progress just so far as that people has the ability to bear the burden which it entails."

Caustic criticism is easy and interesting but alone, it is unproductive. Nothing could be further from the temper of our founding fathers. They were men of faith—they believed in God, in this country, in themselves—and fortified by that spirit they carved out a nation.

Building workable social structures is a slow, frustrating, unglamorous process—the work of teachers, pastors, administrators, parents. They have a right to ask the attackers for blue-prints and solutions, above all for personal involvement. If they cannot produce the first and are unwilling to dig in themselves, let them hold their fire.
