TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Quebec Disaster.

QUEBEC, Sept. 24. Yesterday Major Moyné, Professor at Royal Military College, Kingston, in company with the city engineer, visited Dufferin Terrace and made a tour of inspection around the open fissure. The following is the coroner's official list of those killed by the landslide:—Found dead, 33; died at hospital, 3; missing, 12; total, 48. A largely-attended meeting of citizens was held at the City Hall yesterday, presided over by the Mayor, to take into consideration measures of relief necessary for the sufferers. A committee was appointed to collect subscriptions, also to urge upon the federal authorities their responsibility in the matter both in paying the damage sustained from the rock which fell from their property, and in the prevention of a future disaster of a similar nature. Hon A. P. Caron has arrived here to receive the report of the engineer.

A Bitter Blow.

DUBLIN, Sept. 24. Timothy Haly, while presiding at a meeting of the National League here to-day said that Balfour's renunciation of the Catholic University scheme is a bitter blow to those who sought to consolidate the power of England at the Vatican against the Irish Nationalists. When Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, formerly chief Secretary for Ireland, left Dublin, there was filed at his office at the Castle, a complete scheme for the establishment of a Catholic university in Ireland. Part of the bargain that led to Mgr. Persico's mission intended to muscle the Irish ecclesiastical scheme, but happily failed.

At Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 24. Lord Stanley and party reached here last night in the midst of a drenching rain. There was a large concourse of people at the station to meet the Vice Regal visitors. A torchlight procession was formed, and the party were escorted to Government House, where they will remain as guests of Lieutenant-Governor Schultz during their stay in Winnipeg.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24. Hon. Wilfred Laurier is to speak in Toronto on Monday evening, in North York on October 5th, at Belleville on October 7th and at Picton the following day. The Liberal Convention meets on Thursday.

A New Judge.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24. Wallace Graham, of Halifax, has been appointed to the vacancy in the judiciary of Nova Scotia, caused by the death of Judge James.

In the Field.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24. The Conservatives of Richelieu County have selected J. A. Masse as their candidate for the House of Commons.

New York's Site Chosen

FOR THE PROPOSED WORLD'S FAIR—A MAGNIFICENT LOCATION SELECTED.

A recent New York despatch says: The site for the World's Fair will be selected by the committee appointed for the purchase of this afternoon. The permanent buildings may be located on the plateau on the northwest corner of Central Park, near Eighth Avenue and One Hundred and Tenth Street. The northernmost portion of Central Park above Ninety-Sixth Street will be used. The lands north of the park to One Hundred and Fifteenth Street, from Fifth Avenue to Morningside Park, will be also taken. Riverside Park, Morningside Park and the Bloomingdale, Leske and Wats properties form the remainder of the site. It is also proposed to connect all of the parks, as in London. This would take in Mount Morris Park, which would not be used for fair purposes, however. The site, exclusive of land covered by water, comprises 400 acres, easily accessible from east, west, north and south, and is simple for a world's exposition on the largest scale.
