FIRES IN CHICAGO.—There were six fires in Chicago on the night of the 29th ult. Two men and a woman were seriously burned. At the fire in a house in Ontario street a dozen persons were rescued by the police, while the firemen had to drag the occupants of a house on Warren avenue from their beds in order to save their lives.

Walsh, loaded with produce and horses for Bermuda, which has been lying off St. Peter's Island for several days past, lost an anchor and chain during the gale last evening, and was driven in towards the shore, dangerously near the reef at Point Prima. Two tugs went to her assistance this afternoon.

CANADIAN BARLEY IN ENGLAND.—A cable despatch to the Toronto Globe says: "The report of the jurors who examined samples of Canadian barley recently shown at the Brewers' Exhibition has been forwarded to Ottawa. The jurors consider there is a good market for the higher class of samples whose quality they praise. They offer many hints for the future improvement of the average quality of grain."

HORSES LOST.—The West India steamship Loanda arrived at St. John, N. B., on Saturday last. During her trip out she lost eight horses out of nineteen shipped. Two of the lost animals belonged to Dr. Baghall, and were shipped by him to Barbados. We hope he will not be discouraged so that he will give up the business, as he has been finding new markets for one of our chief exports.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Liquor War in Halifax. HALIFAX, Dec. 4. The liquor war in this city is becoming more interesting. This morning, Ross and McKay, the two informers who have been supplying evidence for the Law and Order League were arrested, charged with conspiracy to obtain violation of the liquor license act of 1886 and with unlawfully participating in the sale of intoxicating liquors. They were arraigned, pleaded not guilty and were remanded till to-morrow.

Captured and Recaptured. LONDON, Dec. 4. Advice from Cape Town state that on Nov. 28th the Portuguese seized Mutacas Kral and hauled down the British flag hoisting the Portuguese flag in its place. A detachment of the British South African Company's police subsequently drove the Portuguese out of the place and captured two leaders. The prisoners were conveyed Fort Salisbury. The police replaced the British flag.

Nationalists' Movement. LONDON, Dec. 4. At a meeting of Nationalists to-day, a committee was appointed to wait upon Gladstone to endeavor to obtain from him the assurance desired by Parnell. The committee consists of Parnell, Sexton, Healy, Justin McCarthy, John Redmond, Deasy, Power and Leary. They will also wait upon Sir William Vernon Harcourt and Morley.

English Egg Market. OTTAWA, Dec. 4. Mr. Saunders, who was investigating in England the prospects for a market there for Canadian eggs and poultry, arrived here to-day, and reports that an unlimited market exists in England for such produce if of good quality and properly shipped. Mr. Saunders sent an experimental shipment ahead of him, which resulted most satisfactorily.

Ottawa Notes. OTTAWA, Dec. 4. The Minister of Marine has reports of an unusual number of wrecks on the Nova Scotia coast during the past few days. Russel & Seybold, wholesale dry goods men, are in financial trouble, with liabilities of a quarter of a million dollars.

Relief for Ireland. LONDON, Dec. 4. In the House of Commons to-day Balfour made a motion that parliament vote £500 for the purpose of providing seed potatoes for distressed land cultivators in Ireland. The appropriation was approved.

The Lockout Broken. DANBURY, Conn., Dec. 4. The lockout of trimmers, which paralyzed the whole hatting industry of Danbury the past two weeks, was broken last midnight. The consummation was achieved by concessions on both sides.

Heavy Damages Claimed. HALIFAX, Dec. 4. A suit has been instituted against the city by the heirs of James Bedford, who was killed by falling through a hole in a sidewalk. The damages are laid at \$20,000.
