CONTRACT BRIDGE

FAMOUS HANDS

Best dealer. Both sides vulnerable. NORTH: A Q 10 9, A 4 2, 8 4 2, K J 7 4. WEST: A 6, K 10 9 8 4 3, A 7 5, 9 2. EAST: 7 5 4 3 2, J, 10 9 8 3, 4 5 3. SOUTH: K J 8, Q 7 5, K Q J, A Q 10 8

The bidding: East South West North Pass 1NT 2 3NT

Opening lead—ten of hearts.

It is difficult to invent a new play in bridge, but this remarkable hand contains a play that comes close to hitting the mark.

History does not record that any South player succeeded in making the three notrump contract, but subsequent analysis reveals the contract should have been made.

The play went pretty uniformly at all tables. West opened a heart, dummy played low, and South took East's jack with the queen. After cashing four club tricks, either a diamond or a spade was led, West taking the

ace. A heart was returned. Declarer had eight tricks at this point. When he tried for the ninth, West promptly took his other ace, ran the hearts, and South wound up a trick short. All the plays made appear to be so natural that it is not easy at first to see where declarer went wrong. Yet the fact is declarer failed to take advantage of a golden opportunity to make the contract.

The proper play is to allow East to win the opening heart lead with the jack! If this is done, nothing can stop South from winning nine tricks.

Assume East returns a diamond. West takes the ace but what can he play back? A heart lead allows declarer to make his queen and a total of ten tricks, while any other lead guarantees nine tricks. Of course, it may be argued that ducking the opening heart is a fine play since the 52 cards are seen, but the play can be supported on pure logic. It is certainly reasonable to assume West has both missing aces to justify his vulnerable overall. It also seems likely West has a six-card suit, but this is not important since the contract cannot be made if he has only five, whether the heart lead is taken or not.

All signs point in one direction. The jack of hearts must be ducked.

Rush Work On Nfld. Ferry

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—CNR machinists Tuesday began fitting bronze propellers on the ferry William Carson, in dry dock here for annual overhaul after a winter run between Argentea, Nfld., and North Sydney, N.S. A CNR official said it is hoped to have the Carson back in service before the end of this week. The vessel's two bronze propellers were damaged last winter in heavy ice. Her steel propellers, normally used in the winter, arrived later. The Carson was built about two years ago to carry passengers, cars and freight between Port aux Basques, Nfld., and North Sydney. She has been carrying freight on the alternative run to Argentea while harbor improvements are being made at Port aux Basques.

CBC Spending Too High, Says

OTTAWA (CP)—A total \$61,358,000 in federal funds for the publicly-owned Canadian Broadcasting Corporation this year is "too much money by any yardstick," Lloyd R. Crouse (PC—Queens-Lunenburg) said in the Commons Thursday. "The time has arrived for a closer examination of the operations of this corporation which desires to spend to much," he said during the throne speech debate. The \$61,358,000 he referred to for the current fiscal year includes \$12,000,000 from 15-per-cent excise tax on radio and television sets and parts and \$59,135,000 as a grant towards an anticipated operating deficit from CBC radio and television. The amount is an increase of \$19,000,000 from last year. Mr. Crouse said he is not suggesting there is mismanagement by the CBC. But the government should place a maximum on CBC expenditures. Some CBC television productions were good but others, while lavish, were neither interesting nor educational.

Turks Sail With 14 Naval Ships

SYDNEY (CP)—Fourteen naval ships turned over to Turkey by Canada under a NATO agreement finally sailed for their new home from here Monday. About half the 1,000 sailors aboard the vessels had been here for the past eight months. The other 500 arrived 3½ months ago. The fleet was made up of 10 Bangor-class escort vessels and four minesweepers. Weekend leaves were cancelled to assure all the Turks were aboard, but one seaman, Sakid Gulmez, was reported still at large after escaping detention at Westmount near here Saturday.

Demand Death For Sex Crimes

LONDON (Reuters)—A woman's conference Wednesday demanded flogging and the death penalty for sexual crimes. Speakers at the Conservative party women's conference said the hangman's noose and the cat-o-nine-tails are the only instruments that would curb sexual offences. Women shouted "bring back the cat" when a government official said she opposed the severe penalties. But delegate Mrs. R. A. Frith said: "These sex maniacs roam the country seeking their prey, knowing that after they murder their victims they can no longer be hanged and if they do not murder they will only receive a slight sentence."

The passing of a new act last year reduced the number of crimes carrying the death penalty. The government has said that since the abolition of corporal punishment in 1948 and the modification of the act murderers have not increased. top notch paintings. 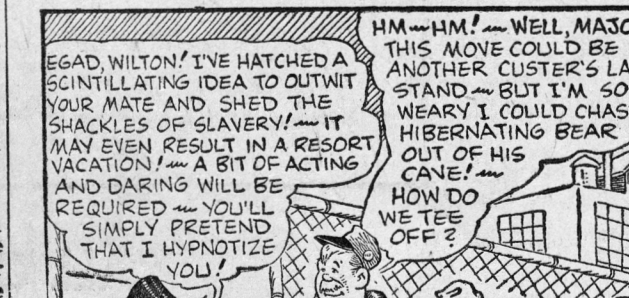
