Court News and Lecture—New London.

The County Court at New London was held on Tuesday and Wednesday last. The docket consisted of 112 suits, and a large number of people were in attendance. Much interest was manifested in a number of suits brought by the Temperance and General Life Insurance Company upon notes given for premiums, which were defended on the ground that these notes were obtained by fraudulent misrepresentation, made by the agent with respect to the terms of insurance. Judgment was rendered in some of these suits, to be delivered in Charlottetown, and in others it was held that the evidence was not sufficient to sustain this defence. Mr. McQuarrie represented the insurance company.

On the evening of the first court day Mr. William S. Stewart entertained the people of Charlottetown with a lecture on "A Winter in Florida." The lecture was a very able effort—well written and well delivered. The lecturer gave a most interesting account of Florida. The resources and natural products of the country, the culture of oranges and other fruit, the methods of agriculture and other sources of industry of the people were fully and clearly described. Its natural scenery, its rivers and lakes, Savannahs and forests, as well as its silver springs and sulphur wells were portrayed in glowingly descriptive language. The manners and customs of the people and their modes of living were also set forth. The condition of the negro before and since his emancipation was ably treated and was on the whole a paper of much literary merit, and was highly appreciated by all present. Judge Alley occupied the chair and at the close of the lecture the meeting was addressed by Messrs. William Campbell, Neil McQuarrie, Capt. John McLeod, Geo. B. McKnight, L. J. Milligan and others, all of whom spoke of it in terms of the highest appreciation.

Notes from the Press Gallery.

The proceedings on Friday in the House were not characterized by anything very eventful. Mr. Mills, of Bothwell, complained about the fees charged by consular agents on goods exported to the United States, and said that this regulation is not applied, so far as he could learn, to goods shipped from any other country into the United States, and it is not required on the part of the British Government in respect of goods shipped from the United States to Great Britain.

The Minister of Finance said it was the practice, as it is considered the best thing to do to avoid greater difficulties on the frontier. He promised to get further information. The Steamboat Inspection Act was advanced a stage and put into committee and reported back agreed to. The House then went into committee of supply and a number of items were passed. After recess the vote was in a particularly bad humor; and who attacked the Minister of Public Works very severely, using language that could hardly be called parliamentary.

The Minister of Public Works, a fine looking man, and one who endeavors to do the best he can to satisfy claimants on his department, was very angry at the insinuations of Mr. Mulock, and administered a severe castigation. Mr. Charlton and Sir Richard Cartwright had to interfere and get Mr. Mulock to retract what he had said, and shortly afterwards the item was passed. In reply to Mr. Davies the Minister of Public Works said that provision was made for quarantine regulations at Charlottetown.

At the close of the sitting Mr. Foster announced that further information on the French treaty would be given on Monday. There is considerable discussion among the members respecting the treaty, and the cablegrams from London are attracting a great deal of attention. Many of the Ontario members are opposed to the provision for admitting French wine, as it will seriously affect the trade in native wine; and the fact has been learned that over 5,000 acres of grapes are grown in the Niagara district.

There also seems to be considerable doubt as to the meaning that will be attached to the admission of fresh fish preserved in their natural shape. It is generally believed that canned lobsters and mackerel will not be admitted under the treaty at the minimum duty. The meeting of the Council on Saturday will decide what action the Government will take, but at the present time it is expected that nothing will be done this session.

The papers laid before the House respecting the tunnel borings bring out the fact that Mr. Palmer had no second agreement with the Finance Minister; and his attempt, by implication, to show that such an agreement existed was emphatically denied by Mr. Foster. Mr. Palmer's great object appears to have been to get an additional \$500 out of the Government, but the Finance Minister firmly told him that he must complete his contract before any more money would be paid.
