Intoxicated Driving Charge Brings Ten-Day Jail Term

A resident of Grandview drew a 10-day jail sentence when he pleaded guilty to a driving while intoxicated charge in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Monday morning.
 The accused was arrested on Friday shortly after his vehicle was involved in an accident in Parkdale.
 He was one of two men appearing before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet on charges of being in control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.
 A Montague man pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while impaired and was given a fine of \$75 and costs or 15 days.
 Two crown witnesses were heard in the case of a Tracadie man charged with theft of an automobile. The case was further adjourned to Monday, December 8th.
FORGERY CHARGE
 The accused has already pleaded guilty to a forgery charge. Sentence on this charge was remanded for one week.
 The complainant in the case is MacNeill Motors of Summerside which charges that the accused sold an automobile he had no right to sell. Witnesses heard Monday were James A. MacNeill, owner and president of the Summerside firm, and Angus Gallant of Oyster Bed Bridge, to whom the car was allegedly sold.
 Three men appeared on charges arising out of violations of the Temperance Act. A Charlottetown man and a resident of the Magdalen Islands were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days when they pleaded guilty to charges of having illegal possession of liquor in a place other than their residences.
 A Sturgeon man was fined \$20 and costs or 20 days when he appeared on a charge of being intoxicated in a public place.
 Three men appeared on charges of operating unregistered motor vehicles on the highway.
REPRIMAND
 Fines of \$10 and costs or 10 days were given residents West Royalty and New Glasgow. A Peakes man pleaded guilty to a similar charge. He got off with a reprimand when circumstances surrounding the incident were revealed.
 A fine of \$10 and costs or 10 days was handed a Winsloe man when he pleaded guilty to a speeding charge.
 Water Street and King Street men appearing on charges of being drunk and incapable were each fined \$10 and costs or five days. A Rocky Point man appearing on a similar charge was fined \$5 and costs or two days.

Program For Winter Jobs Went Into Effect Monday

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government's program to help municipalities create jobs by going ahead with winter works went into effect Monday.
 During the five-month incentive program, expiring next April 30, the government will foot half the direct payroll costs of approved winter works projects and undertaken by municipalities.
 Eight provinces are taking part in the program. Quebec and Prince Edward Island have not declared their intentions.
FURTHER INCENTIVES
 Four of the participating provinces have added further incentives to the municipalities. Manitoba has offered to pay 30 per cent of the remaining payroll costs, leaving the municipalities in that province with only 20 per cent.
 Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta are paying 25 per cent, with Alberta offering to arrange financing of its municipalities' share in the projects.
 No announcement was made of any projects already approved for federal payments. It was understood that a number of municipal projects are being processed.
 Under the plan, the province must approve the projects before federal participation is sought.
 To qualify for federal contributions, winter works must be of a kind not normally undertaken in winter, a slack employment period, and must be designed to create jobs.
 Works coming under terms of the federal offer of assistance, made last Nov. 29, are construction and major reconstruction of streets, sidewalks, municipal roads, water, sewage and storm sewage facilities not including buildings and municipal parks and playgrounds.
 Under the program, most workers on the jobs must be persons otherwise unemployed and normally seeking work during the winter.
 The National Employment Service will work with municipal authorities in directing unemployed workers to jobs and the provinces have been asked to ensure that going wage rates will apply on all municipal projects covered by the program.

Rev. H. L. Mitton was elected president of the Charlottetown Ministerial Association at the annual meeting of the association held in the Dominion Building yesterday.
 Other officers elected for the year 1958-59 were: Rev. W. H. Forsythe, vice-president; John Evans, secretary; Rev. T. H. Somers, treasurer; Rev. J. H. Bishop, convener of radio devotional broadcast and Rev. A. E. Piercy, convener of institution care.
 The meeting was opened with a devotional period led by Rev. Piercy. Reports were then heard from the president and the treasurer.

 The clinics, being held in Trinity Social Hall, conclude tonight.

Pair Remanded For Sentencing

Two youths were remanded to this morning for sentencing when they pleaded guilty to a theft charge in Charlottetown Police Court Monday morning.
 The pair, residents of Douglas Street, were charged with the theft of an automobile battery and a car radio aerial from a car parked at a service station in Charlottetown.
 A city man paid a fine of \$50 and costs or 20 days when he pleaded guilty to speeding through the city's streets.
