TALES TOLD BY MEN IN THE FIGHTING LINES ON LAND AND ON SEA

A CONVERSATION IN LATIN.

A Lieutenant in the Indian Army writes:
I went to occupy a trench from which the Germans had lately been evicted. It was quite dark, and on entering the trench at the head of my party I heard someone talking in a low voice. I crept forward and quietly as I could saw what I imagined must be a doctor supporting the head of a wounded man. I called upon him to surrender, and he held up a crucifix towards me, so I knew he must be a priest.

The priest was giving absolution to a dying Bavarian. A few minutes later I went up to the priest, who, however, could not understand English or French. I know very little German; only a few words, in fact, so we fell back on Latin, in which tongue we held a short and very halting conversation. As far as I could make out he said that the Germans were suffering much from sickness, and he disliked the Prussians most cordially. Eventually I allowed him to return to the German trenches, which I expect and hope that he reached in safety. My men expostulated afterwards at my letting him go, as they thought it most important to kill the German "Pater."

The courage of the German priest in remaining to give absolution to his dying countryman surpasses anything I have heard myself in the course of the present war, as he must have known that he would fall into the hands not of British soldiers, who might possibly have respected his calling, but into those of men who must have been presented to him as barbarous savages.

WOMAN TELLS OF KING ALBERT.

King Albert has conferred upon Mrs. Knocker the Order of Leopold in recognition of her services since the beginning of the war, with Dr. Hector Moore's field ambulance, and in a letter to friends Mrs. Knocker describes how his Majesty bestowed the distinction.

"Last Sunday," she writes, "M— and I got a message from the Colonel asking us if we would like the King to accompany us on a tour of the front, or whether we would go to him. Of course we said we would go to him. So he graciously sent a car for us and we all went down to—"

"All the officers were being decorated on the same day, and we felt horribly nervous, and when we saw the King coming towards us we felt worse than ever." But he was so kind and nice and he had a long chat with us in English; asked us all about Pervyse and congratulated us and said he was very grateful for all we had done and all England was still doing for Belgium.

Then he pinned the decoration on us and congratulated us again, and we watched the others being decorated.

"After everyone had received the various decorations the King made a speech to us all, and then we went home.
