LOBSTER FISHING SEASON.—According to a late Ottawa despatch the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has been deluged with telegrams during the past few days asking for an extension of time for lobster fishing in the maritime provinces. The Minister feels it necessary to enforce the close season and declined to accede to any of these requests.

ROLLO STEAM ENGINE.—The Summerside Agriculturist says: "A practice with the steam fire engine 'Rollo' took place at Queen's Wharf here Tuesday evening. She carried two streams of water through a long stretch of hose, but failed to throw it to any great height, and the test was not at all satisfactory. She cannot do anywhere nearly as good work as the 'Beaver,' and we understand that she will be returned to Charlottetown."

SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.—The Summer School of Science of the maritime provinces meets this year in Yarmouth, July 5th, to 23rd, inclusive. The students are to be entertained, free of charge, the sum of \$200 being voted by the Town Council to recompense persons thus entertaining. This generous offer will no doubt be eagerly accepted by a large number of teachers, who can thus combine a cheap outing with modern methods of teaching science, under the instruction of competent teachers.

SHIPPED FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Farmer says: On Monday Mr. W. B. Bowness took away five horses, and on Tuesday Mr. Ed. Gorrill took over two. On the latter day Mr. Chas. A. McNutt sent away 54 sheep and 9 live hogs and Mr. P. McDonald, sr., 43 head of cattle, this making about 100 since June 10 for him. On Wednesday Mr. D. Keefe took away 11 cattle and 15 sheep, Mr. J. Heffernan 20 cattle and C. Kane shipped 16 hogs to Jas Kane of St. John. There has also been considerable wool going this week again and on Tuesday some four or five cars of pressed hay was taken away and on Wednesday two cars additional.

GEORGETOWN CONVENTION.

McDonald and Gordon Unanimously Chosen—Over 100 Delegates Present—From Little Pond to Murray Harbor North.

At a large and representative meeting of delegates held here today, the old members, McDonald and Gordon, were unanimously chosen to contest this district at the forthcoming election. The meeting was called to order. On motion of Hon. A. J. McDonald the Hon. Jas. Clow was elected Chairman and the undersigned Secretary. Hon. D. Gordon being called upon, came forward and gave the doings of the Peters' Government in such a clear style that he was repeatedly cheered, and judging from the enthusiasm his election is assured.

Hon. A. J. McDonald was the next speaker. He scored the Peter's government for their extravagant and reckless way of managing public business and time and again was cheered. The question now rests how much will McDonald's majority be, some delegates saying it would be up in the thousands.

J. C. Underhay, Esq., of Bay Fortune, being called upon gave one of his old time ringers, scoring the present government for their reckless extravagance and "mud machines" saying he had never travelled over worse roads in all his life than he did today.

On motion of J. C. Underhay, Esq., of Bay Fortune, seconded by Pius Flanagan, Esq., Royalty, that Hon. D. Gordon be one of our candidates to contest this district at the fourth coming election. Carried.

On motion of William Reid, Esq., Murray Harbor North, seconded by Capt. John Hemphill, Burnt Point, that Hon. A. J. McDonald be one of our candidates to contest this district at the forthcoming election. Carried after ringing speeches from George McDonald, Esq., John Howlett, Esq., Annandale; William Reid, Esq., Daniel McKinnon, Esq., Murray Harbor North; Roderick McLellan, Hugh A. McPhee, St. Georges, and a lot of others. The meeting was brought to a close by a vote of thanks being tendered to the chairman. The meeting broke up with three cheers for the Queen and the candidates.
