ST. PATRICK'S HALL.—Monday night week.

FIRE.—The large clothing house of Clayton & Sons, in Halifax, was destroyed by fire on Saturday night. Apart from the insurance the firm will lose about \$50,000 on the stock.

GUNS TAMPERED WITH.—The guns at Fort Edward are continually being tampered with and when it is necessary to use them they are very often found to be unfit for service. In almost every instance where this is the case, it is found that they have been filled or partly filled with sticks or stones, and yesterday it was found that one of the guns had been spiked. The officers of the artillery offer a reward of \$10 for such information as will lead to the conviction of any person found tampering with these guns.

A BIG LOBSTER.—A giant lobster captured a few days ago by a fisherman off the New England coast knocks higher than a kite the biggest monarch of the crustacean tribe ever taken from Canadian waters. This monster is supposed to be about 100 years old and weighs 31½ pounds. It measured 3 feet 6 inches from the tip of the tail to the top of the outstretched claw. The antennae are 14 inches long and the distance around each of the claws at the thickest part is 1 foot 8 inches. The legs are a foot in length and the body measurement two feet. The lobster will be presented to the aquarium in New York.—Bangor Commercial.

PROHIBITION LAW COMING.—A Halifax dispatch says: The Grand Division, S. of N. of Nova Scotia in its quarterly report just issued, says \$200 was promised to B. H. Eaton of this city for his work in drafting a prohibition act to have been produced at the last session of the legislature. It was not introduced for various causes, and a reduction in Mr. Eaton's charge was made for the cash payment. The Grand Division express the conviction that at the next session of the legislature, owing to the pledging of candidates in the local election, the prohibitory law is a certainty. The report condemns the government's proposed direct taxation rider to the prohibition plebiscite.

THE FISK JUBILEE SINGERS.

The visit of the Jubilee Singers is always looked forward to with pleasant expectation. On this occasion there existed some doubt as to the genuineness of the present company; but it is satisfactory to know that these are the original Fisk Jubilee Singers who were here some two or three years ago, with Mrs. Porter-Cole as soprano. Mrs. Cole is not with the company this time; but the basso, Mr. Caldwell, is still as delightful as ever, and the tenor, Mr. Payne, was heard last night with pleasure in a song specially requested by some of his admirers.

Of the numbers on the programme last night the negro melodies were without doubt most appreciated. These gifted people interpret the sentiments of their songs with such fidelity that it is impossible not to be impressed. One never tires of hearing them. The negro song, "Were you there when they crucified my Lord," was delivered with a pathos that would touch any heart. Another number, not on the programme—but a genuine treat all the same—was the tenor solo and chorus "Take me back" in response to an encore. In all the items of the programme the chorus singing was most enjoyable, the harmony in the last number, "Pinsuti's, Good Night Beloved" being something perfect. Those who were inclined to mourn the absence of Mrs. Cole felt less regret after they heard the soprano solo of Miss Calloway, whose voice is clear and true and of rich quality and good compass. The basso is as popular as ever and in good voice gave in fine style "The Armourer's Song" from Robin Hood, and set his audience laughing by responding to an encore with "The Laziest Man."

The Opera House was not quite filled. It should have been overflowing. It is probable that to-night will see a full house, for the opportunity to hear these singers is one that should not be missed.

The programme for this evening's entertainment will be as follows: O Sinner Man, Negro song, followed by the Lord's Prayer; Humble Yourself, Negro song; Bass Solo, Deep in the Mine, J. N.
