# The Transvaal War

## THE BURIAL OF OUR HEROES.

## HOW THE GALLANT IRISH CROSSED THE BRIDGE.

One of the most thrilling incidents of the advance of General Buller's troops to the relief of Ladysmith is related in a letter from Col. Sergt. Mills, of the Royal Dublin Fusiliers, written to his brother in Ottawa. His battalion had to cross an exposed bridge on the way to attack a hill. Boers lined the kopjes a short distance from the bridge, and the Fusiliers crossed one at a time, the Boers shooting at every man. The enemy brought down fifty Fusiliers before the bridge was sand-bagged, and thus protected from the enemy. It was a veritable gauntlet of death, and Sergt. Mills says that had the Boers been as good shots as they are reported to be they could have brought down a great many more. When the battalion was across the bridge, the donga over which the bridge led contained many dead, and dying Irish. A newspaper clipping giving an item about the death-trap accompanied the letter, and Sergt. Mills gives his experience. He says: "When it was my turn to cross, I followed, waited until the man ahead was under cover, and then ran for my life making long leaps till I had covered the fifty yards, and reached cover. The Boers were evidently loading as for some cause they did not shoot at me till I had about reached the end of the run, then a number of bullets whistled harmlessly by. It was the fastest fifty yards sprint I have ever made." Sergt. Mills says the Dublins had the honor of being the first battalion to march through Ladysmith. As they neared Ladysmith they saw the heaps of sandbags used by the Boers for the purpose of attempting to dam the Klip River. They were given a great reception.

According to Boer reports there is a steady flow of foreign volunteers to the Transvaal. Hitherto these adventurers have been attached to the various commandoes. Now it is said they are to be formed into a special legion, with continental officers, and there is a rumor that the command will be given to a distinguished French soldier, lately retired, who is now in the Transvaal or nearing the end of the journey thither. Presumably the officer referred to is General de Negrier, former member of the French Supreme Council of War, who was removed from the

active list last July by the Marquis de Gallifet, as a disciplinary measure during the excitement arising from the Dreyfus court martial. General de Negrier had the reputation of having been one of the ablest officers in the French army, when he was dismissed from it by General de Gallifet soon after the Dreyfus trial at Rennes, for displaying antagonism to the prisoner in a manner which was held to be subvertive of discipline.

The women and children at Kimberley who were sheltered and fed in the mines during the bombardment have subscribed money to buy a gold cigarette case and a gold match box for Cecil Rhodes, who allowed them to use the mines, and who did much to relieve their sufferings and discomforts. An address expressing gratitude will also be presented to Mr. Rhodes.

Lady Sarah Wilson, writing from Mafeking, says: "As to our soldiers, they may think they would like more fighting, though it seems to me there has been enough here to satisfy most people—they may grumble at being cooped up in this little town—but when the history of this war comes to be written, people who should know are of opinion that Mafeking will be found to have displayed no small part in the huge task of holding South Africa, and they will remember the old quotation: "They also serve who only stand and wait."

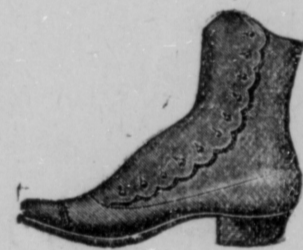
